TRACK AT BLUE BONNETS UNDER COVER FOR WINTER

THE BIG EVENT AT HOBBERLIN'S

Many Improvements Made Since the Racing Season Closed—Hundreds of Citizens Crowd the Big Tailor Shops—Reasons for the Big Sale.

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.—Altho the gates of Blue Bonnets have been closed to the ponies for a number of weeks back, there has been a good deal of work going on at the track in the interests of the patrons of the races that will add to the general comforts of this well-appointed race course in the future.

A large amount of money has been spent in the draining the paddock, which is a gravel walk, nicely curved to carry off the water, while the ditches along the sides have been tiled. This was a much needed improvement that will undoubtedly be appreciated by those who make use of the railway route to reach the course.

Since the races the track itself has also received proper care and attention and the running line has gone to sleep for the winter under a covering that will protect it from the frost and permit of that early work in the spring that will be required to give it that fast condition which maintained during the past season. The hosiery in general were loud in their praises of the track during the autumn meeting, when the absence of rain presented the opportunity of testing its speed qualities.

BUYERS SECURE BARGAINS

At the Tuesday Sale at Burns & Sheppard's Repository.

Considering the weather conditions yesterday, there was an exceptionally good attendance at Burns & Sheppard's Repository at their regular Tuesday sale. About fifty horses were disposed of, and also Tuesday is not usually a bargain day, some extra good bargains were knocked down by Auctioneer Isaac Watson, G. Y. McCarty of Brucefield bought five extra good ones at prices that were really cheap for the class of stock—a splendidly mated team of bay geldings, weighing about 300 lbs., with extra good feet and legs; a pair that could about draw anything. They were hitched, too, and extra good walkers, as well as good-actioned fellows. This pair was sold for \$75. A good, heavy brown gelding, serviceably mated team of bay geldings, for \$15; also a pair of bay geldings, the real sort, for \$20. Geo. Watson bought a big, upstanding, high-headed gelding, just the kind for delivery work, and one that can road some, for \$25. Another extra good grey gelding, a splendidly made fellow, perfectly broken to city sights and sounds, with plenty of action and a beautiful color, he paid \$17.50 for.
