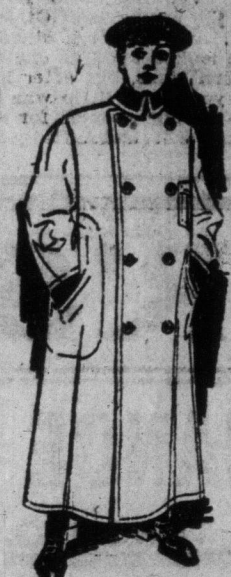

Note and Comment

The O. J. C. fall meeting closes to-day and will be of unusual social importance, as the gubernatorial party from Ottawa will pay their final visit to these parts. The program is also superlative, and includes six races of a mile or over, and on the flat, the O. J. C. Cup, at 2 1/2 miles. There is also a six-furlong dash.

Racing will commence to-day at two o'clock. Members' cars will leave the Queen's Hotel at 1:30 and 1:45, and the directors' car for the luncheon at twelve o'clock. Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Countess Grey, the Ladies Stirling and Evelyn Gray, and his excellency's staff will be present.

The alleged All-Stars are playing baseball again to-day in Baltimore against the Rochester champions. Each team has a gun to its credit, and it matters little which wins, as there is nothing at stake except the gate.

Who the baseball world seemingly considers the New York Giants' horse a strange-hold on the National League hunting, the National Commission is going to take no chances in preparing the schedule for the world's series. The commission will prepare two schedules at a meeting to be held in Cincinnati. The series will commence on Oct. 1, and the Philadelphia-New York schedule will call for a game in each city every other day. The Chicago-Philadelphia schedule will be very similar to the one arranged for those teams last season. The commission will decide in which city the opening contest will be played by the toss of a coin. The headquarters of the National Commission during the series will be in New York.

Stuffy McInnis, the brilliant first-baseman of the Philadelphia Athletics, winners of the American League pennant, may be unable to play in the world's championship series. McInnis was seriously injured when he tried to stop one of Mullin's lineouts with his wrist in a game on Tuesday. The injury has not responded to treatment, and Connie Mack has now decided that his star first-baseman must go to the hospital and submit to an X-ray examination. If it turns out that one of the small bones in the wrist is broken, McInnis will have to watch the battles for the highest honors in baseball from the benches. McInnis' former prominence early in the season, when he played a dashing game at short field, while Barry was filled with treble, was so strong that when Barry returned a place was soon made for Mullin at first base, which was filled so long and well by Barry Davis.

TECUMSEHS V. VANCOUVER TO-DAY FOR MINTO CUP

C. L. A. Orders St. Catharines-Maitland Game Played Over Again—Lacrosse Notes.

The first Minto Cup match will be played at Vancouver to-day, between the Tecumsehs of Toronto, champions of the N.L.A. challenge, and the Vancouver Lacrosse Club, defenders. The total goals in the two games to be played decide possession of the cup. The ball will be faced by Lord Desborough, and he will be accompanied to the center of the field by Lord Charles Beresford and the Duke of Sutherland. Bob Cheyne of New Westminster will be the referee. Charlie Quirle selected him from a list of nine or ten Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster men submitted by the Vancouver Lacrosse Club. He is the old Toronto Ontario goalkeeper. The teams will line up as follows: Tecumsehs—Goal, Kinsman; point, Green; cover, Yeaman; first defence, Graydon; second defence, Rountree; third defence, McKenney; centre, Feller; third home, Quirle; second home, Murton; first home, Burton; outside, McGregor; outside, McDougall. Vancouver—Goal, Clarke; point, Griffith; cover, Picketing; first defence, West; second defence, Ikin; third defence, Godfrey; centre, Matheson; third home, Burton; second home, Allen; first home, Phelan; outside, Adamson; inside, Lalonde. The C.L.A. committee last night decided that the St. Catharines-Maitland intermediate game to be played over again at St. Catharines next Saturday. 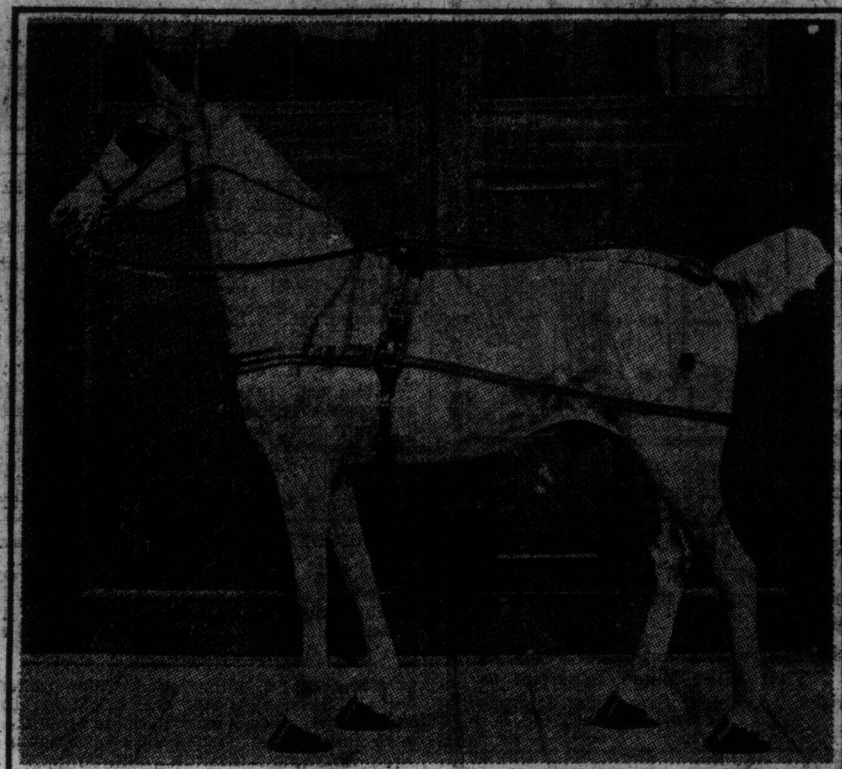

MRS. LIVINGSTON'S HORSES BRING SPLENDID PRICES.

The sale held yesterday of Mrs. L. A. Livingston's yearlings and two-year-olds by Maher's store Exchange at the Woodbine paddock may justly be claimed to be the greatest sale of its kind ever held anywhere or at any time in Canada. And when it is considered that the average of the American yearlings and two-year-olds in Kentucky last week were only \$200, and that Mrs. Livingston's consignment realized an average of \$315 per head, it might also be said that the sale was the greatest sale of the class and age sold anywhere in recent years. Despite the heavy rain, the sale was well attended, and a very large attendance of whom were buyers.

William Fitch of Hamilton conducted the sale, and the greatest possible credit is due to him for the masterly manner in which the business was transacted, the excellent result being of a class that is seldom heard of in this country. The sales were: A. H. Speers, Winnipeg, purchased the yearling filly Quivver for \$140; A. A. Coades for the yearling filly Anita for \$50; the bargain of the sale; A. D. Simon, Harris, Ont., purchased the bay colt Corrallo for \$900; John Flynn, Prescott, got the bay yearling filly Auster for \$200; the bay yearling colt March went to Mr. H. H. Roberts of Simcoe for \$200; C. D. Jones of Hamilton bought the chestnut filly Broad Place two years old, for \$165; D. J. Gorman of Ottawa got the chestnut filly Gorman of Ottawa for \$100; Mr. Allan Case, city, purchased a two-year-old chestnut colt, Stimul for \$280; W. F. Gorman of Ottawa got the two-year-old chestnut filly Bud for \$200; A. R. Speers of Winnipeg bought the chestnut colt Liburne for \$145; J. H. Edmunds, city, got the greatest prize of the sale, a two-year-old bay filly named Demosene for \$150; W. G. Wilson, city, purchased the two-year-old chestnut filly Dan for \$110.
