

In urging the second reading of his bill to prevent the spread of pulmonary and other forms of tuberculosis. Dr. McQueen drew attention to the fact that out of all the expenditures of the province, or, y at pairty \$271,000 was spent annually on hospitals and sanitaria. He explained moreover, that while 86 per cent. of the cases reported in 1908 diad, \$2% per cent. died in 1909, and 89 per cent. in 1910. Compulsory notification of the provincial board of health was one of the preventive methods advocated.
