BIG JEFF TURNS TACK ON CUBS

Tesreau, Pitching in Grand Form, Downed Chicago 7 to 4 in Second of Series.

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—With Tesreau pitching in fine form, New York defeated Chicago 7 to 4 to-day and evened up the series. The big right-handed pitcher held Chicago to three hits until the ninth inning, while New York drove two pitchers out of the box early in the game. New York forced Jimmy Lavender, who started the game for Chicago, to retire before he had pitched two innings. Then Tesreau was sent into the box, but gave way to Cheney in the seventh after New York had made four runs off him. New York got a run off Cheney in the eighth and he was relieved by Toney in the ninth.

Tesreau was given brilliant support. Murray made two sensational catches, running back into the crowd and pulling down drives that otherwise would have gone for two base hits. New York ran wild on the bases, stealing six off Archer and one off Cotter.
