China's Loan Negotiations

Peking, Friday, Jan. 4.—The negotiations by which Japan was to advance to China the sum of £10,000, 000 for the purpose of improving the position of the Bank of China, were to have been completed today, but the signing was postponed at the last moment. The delay is declared to be due to the decision of the British, French and American banking groups to participate actively in the loan.

A despatch from Peking on Dec. 31, said that Japan would loan the money to China with the object of exercising control over currency reform. The Japanese, it was added, had notified the other banking groups that unless they were willing that unless they were willing to par-ticipate in the loan it would be ne-gotiated solely by Japanese interests.

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
