

WHOLESALE FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Oranges.—The wholesales are almost destitute of oranges of all descriptions, and, as both the Florida and California crops were exceptionally light this season, and a large percentage of them have already been used, it is going to be difficult for the wholesalers to secure supplies.

Potatoes.—As potatoes are still quite scarce, prices kept firm, Ontarios selling at \$2.20 to \$2.25 per bag, and New Brunswicks Delawares at \$2.40 to \$2.50 per bag.

Green Vegetables.—Leaf lettuce is arriving pretty freely, medium-sized selling at 25c to 30c per dozen bunches; choice large selling at 45c per dozen. Greengreens are being offered at 85c per dozen large bunches; Brussels sprouts at 15c per box.

A. A. McKinnon had New Brunswick Delaware potatoes at \$2.40 per bag; Onions at \$2.20 per bag; Spanish onions at \$5 per large and \$2.50 per half-case.

New-laid Eggs—Apparently the greater number of buyers have balked at paying the high price for new-laid eggs, for, though there was an odd dozen sold at 95c, and

Poultry—Poultry was only brought in
very small quantities, and, therefore,
well at slightly firmer prices, chick-
ens bringing from 23c to 35c per lb.;

lb.; fowl, from 24c to 30c per lb., and
ducks from 35c to 42c per lb.
