Government Detective John W. Murray returned to the city on Saturday night from Norwich, where he has been prosecuting an inquiry regrding a number of fires that have recently, taken place in that town under cirumstances so suspicious that it is with ,

taken place in that town under cir-cumstances so suspicious that it is with , difficulty that the insurance companies can be prevalled upon to accept a risk in the locality. Therefore, a commit-tee of prominent townspeople asked an investigation. The first fire enquired into took place on June 14 last, at the jeweiry store of W. E. Cobart. The evidence went to show that Cobart, who is a young man, purchased his stock and business about two years ago from G. C. Sutton, agreeing to pay \$450 for same. Since that time it would only appear that he had bought \$200 worth of new stock. Still his stock book showed \$1500, and on that he secured \$1000 insurance. When his premises were burned he was hard up, and, in addition to what he owed Mr. Sutton, he was behind a year's rent. The fire started shortly after midnight in a hall above the store.
