HAS BEEN RESUMED IN NEW FORM

Winnipeg, May 23.—(Special.)—The legislative fight over the Roblin railway deal is to be followed by a legal fight, and the gauntlet was thrown down today in the Court of King's Bench by the entering of an action against the Manitoba Government, the Canadian Northern Railway and the Northern Pacific Railway, the object of which is to get the court to declare the contracts void, and to prohibit the Government of Manitoba from carrying out the transfer of the Northern Pacific line to the Manitoba Government.

PORT ARTHUR WATER POWER.

Ottawa, May 23.—(Special.)—When the last issue of the session had been put into to-day in the Commons Mr. Borden asked for a statement regarding the position regarding the Alaskan boundary. The present has unambiguously, he said, been the United States, which occupies territory that belongs to Canada, was unwilling to submit the question to arbitration, as Great Britain had done regarding the Venezuelan boundary. The longer the United States is allowed to hold the territory the more difficult it will be to obtain a satisfactory settlement.

He was able to walk home, but had evidently sustained an internal injury from which he did not really recover, as above stated.

LEAD REFINERY AT ONCE.

Trail Smelter People Will Proceed With the Construction of the Necessary Works.

Ottawa, Ont., May 23.—It is rumored that the Canadian Smelting Works of Trail, B.C., now the largest producers of lead bullion in Canada, will proceed immediately with the construction of a lead refinery. It has not yet been decided whether these works will be located in or at some point on the Atlantic seaboard. There is also some talk to the effect that Canadian capital is being raised for the purpose of erecting white lead works in the east.
