ervative paper published in Essex
County," describing two of them, and
like those named helping him he
would never grace the seat now oc-
cupied by Mr. Rowland.

Mr. Graham was not disposed to
hold up the Provincial Secretary as a
martyr, and denounce the member for
Manitoulin as a bad man, but he
thought the Conservatives were mak-
ing a mistake in holding up Gurney as
a hero until he has had the opportunity
of proving his charges. The Provin-
cial Secretary was entitled to a fair
trial. In condemning a man until he
has been tried, the newspapers are mak-
ing a mistake in attempting to in-
troduce Lynch law into Ontario.

Going back to 1884, Mr. Graham
showed that the bribery charges were
not entirely analogous to the present
case. Then the speaker turned to the
Speaker's hands and a resolution
passed to impound it with all the docu-
ments relating to the charge. In the
present case the money had not been
delivered up, but some of the Con-
servative speakers had gone so far as
to impugn the honor of the Speaker,
by saying the documents might be
false. Mr. Graham said that the
documents were not in his hands.

All Disqualified.

Mr. Graham went over the list of
Conservative speakers to adduce the
argument that they had disqualified
themselves from acting on the jury,
and he showed that the members of
the government side who had pre-
judged the case in favor of the accused.
There was no impartial jury, and
therefore it would be impossible to find
an impartial jury from the members
of the House.

Was it true that courts of justice
were not courts of justice, but that
white-washing courts were the only
courts of justice? Mr. St. John: Does the hon. gentleman
argue that the commission is a
committee of the House?

Mr. Graham: It is an investigation
under the laws of Ontario, passed for
the purpose of ascertaining whether
there was any bribery or not.

Mr. St. John: Is the commission
proposed by the House?

Mr. Graham: The hon. gentleman
should buy a dictionary. This is a
mere play upon words. The commis-
sion is not a committee of the House.

The member for Brockville went on
to argue that commissions could bring
a finding.

The opposition did not wish to drag
the judiciary into this affair. That is
what the judges are for, to settle
disputes which cannot be settled in
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
