BRITISH CLAIMS WERE ABANDONED

Treaty With the United States Was a Surrender, Says London Standard.

London, Feb. 17.—The Standard, editorially, infers from past experience that the semi-official announcement that the negotiations for a arbitration treaty between Great Britain and the United States are making satisfactory headway means a surrender to the United States. It says that, judged by results, Great Britain has always been wrong when in a controversy with America. The Standard infers from the fact that it is stated the negotiations include certain arbitration questions, and it recalls, among other things, the Newfoundland question, in which it says, "the ingenious and patriotically unscrupulous Root played with Bryce as a cat plays with a mouse." It hopes that their Wilfrid Laurier and Blaine to Root, have increasingly presumed upon the British sense of kinship, but it never occurred to the British envoys to act in a similar manner. Owing to the culpable simplicity or absurd timidity of British officials, the successive conventions mark so many abandonments of British claims, which most people here believe were British rights.

The Standard's alarm is not aroused by the mere question of arbitration, but it is due to the fact that it is stated the negotiations include certain arbitration questions, and it recalls, among other things, the Newfoundland question, in which it says, "the ingenious and patriotically unscrupulous Root played with Bryce as a cat plays with a mouse." MUST STAND TRIAL FOR MURDER

Continued From Page One.

The Evidence.

In yesterday's Advertiser the evidence up to 11 o'clock was given. The following testimony was added after that hour:

Mr. Day, in answer to a question by Mr. McKillop, said he thought that on account of local opinion having been declared at Thorndale, that Hartwick had not been able to procure as much liquor of late as had been his wont.

The remainder of the witness' testimony was similar to that which he had given at the inquest, with the exception that he added that Hartwick must have been insane on Sunday night to have waded through three feet of snow, as he did to come to his (Day's) house to borrow a Bible, when he already had one of his own.

Stanley Bathurst.

Stanley Bathurst, a farm laborer, employed by Mr. Day, corroborated the previous witness' testimony, and added that Hartwick had visited the Day home on the Saturday previous to the murder, attired in his stocking feet.

Previous to that he had seen Hartwick in his own yard, preening. The snow at that time was over two feet deep.

Hartwick then said that he had had a dream, but would not tell the witness what it was about.

Bathurst then gave the old man some hot tea and provided him with a cap, some rubbers, and a pair of mitts.

The Days live about a quarter of a mile from the Hartwick home. Bathurst had offered to take a piece of fresh meat, and the latter had refused it, saying that a ministering angel had supplied him with food.

Stanley Burch.

The evidence of Stanley Burch, a farm laborer, living half a mile from the Hartwick home, was exactly the same as given at the inquest. The witness had visited the Hartwicks on the day of the murder about 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mrs. Hartwick was then still alive, but complained of being very ill. Blood had been noticed on the floor, covered over with ashes.

Constable Faircloth.

Constable Faircloth told the evidence he gave at the inquest, when he stated that Hartwick, when found by his dead wife's bed, the Monday following the murder, was attired in two coats.

The testimony of Sidney Faircloth, a son of the previous witness, was simply to the effect that he had assisted in the arrest of the prisoner, who had fought a good part of the way to the station, and later to London.

Admission of Guilt.

Hartwick had made the admission to the witness that he had killed his wife at 11 o'clock on Sunday night.

While on his way to the jail the prisoner had talked a great deal of a cow which he had sold or traded.

Constable Stanyer.

The evidence of Constable Stanyer showed that he had visited the Hartwick home on the 2nd of February, and had found blood on the floor in several places.

This was covered with ashes and four.

At Hartwick was dead in bed. There had also been found in the house a large quantity of hard cider, turned black from contact with the tin can it was in.

The prisoner, in the witness' opinion, was quarellsome, when drinking. This concluded the testimony.
