BRITAIN MAY HAVE NEW CABINET CRISIS

LOYD GEORGE PARIS SPEECH MAY CAUSE CABINET CRISIS; TALK OF UNIONIST REBELLION

Chancellor Bonar Law May Leave Ministry If Party's Rank and File Disapprove of the New War Policy Announced by Premier.

London, Nov. 14.—Premier Lloyd George explained to the House of Commons today that the inter-Allied Council, the establishment of which was arranged for at the recent conference of British, French and Italian representatives, would have no extensive power. He said the final decision in regard to the matters of strategy and the distribution and movement of armies would rest with the several governments of the Allies. The new council, Mr. Lloyd George said, would be charged with the duty of surveying continuously the field of operations as a whole in the light of information derived from all the governments and staffs, and also of co-ordinating plans and making plans of its own, if necessary, for the better conduct of the war.

London, Nov. 14.—The war cabinet is said to be at one with the premier in all the essential points of his Paris speech, and the policy which it announced, and of being prepared to hold to this policy. The attitude of the rank and file of the Unionists will have a considerable effect on the parliamentary situation, as Chancellor Bonar Law has always said he would not remain a member of the coalition cabinet unless he retained the general support of the Unionists. There is a good deal of criticism of the premier's new policy from the Unionists, although their attitude, of course, may be changed by the speech Mr. Lloyd George is to make.

In his speech at Paris, Lloyd George declared the Allies would have to prosecute the war as one army under a single leadership.

HALIFAX LIBERALS REFUSE TO UNITE WITH BORDENITES, AND NOMINATE TWO

Blackadder and Redmond Are Laurier Standard-Bearers in Premier's Stronghold.

Halifax, Nov. 14.—Dr. E. Blackadder and George E. Redmond, two of the last night selected as Laurier Liberal candidates for the election in Halifax city and county by the Liberal Association. The association refused an offer from the Unionist convention, which also met last night, to agree upon the election of two Unionist candidates by acclamation.

Dr. Blackadder was the defeated candidate at the 1911 election, Sir Robert Borden's majority being 151. CHATHAM, N. B., Nov. 14.—The Union Government met last night and unanimously nominated Mr. Loggie, prominent Liberal and Conservative, as the candidate for the Chatham constituency.

MANITOBA BY-ELECTION. Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 14.—At a meeting of the cabinet council today, the dates for the provincial by-elections in Irberville and Minnedosa were fixed for December 7, nomination day to be on November 20.

OPPOSE UNION GOVERNMENT. St. John, N. B., Nov. 14.—If several hundred Liberals of the St. John constituency meet here today, they will in the party convention two straight party men supporting Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be nominated. Resolutions to this effect and opposing the Union Government were adopted.

REGINA LABORITE NOMINATED. Regina, Nov. 14.—Alderman Harry Perry was last night nominated by the Labor party to contest the federal constituency of Regina. He did not give a definite answer.

BREWSTER OUT OF IT. Victoria, B. C., Nov. 14.—Premier Brewster stated yesterday that he has no intention of running for federal honors, and A. C. Plummer, prominently mentioned as Unionist candidate for Victoria, will not permit his name to go before the convention tonight. Chief Justice Hunter is a probable candidate. The Great War Veterans are demanding a candidate acceptable to them.

LAURIER OPPOSES SIR SAM. Lindsay, Nov. 13.—George Isaac, a grover and rancher of Fenelon Falls, has announced his decision to enter the field as a straight Liberal against Sir Sam Hughes in the coming election. Mr. Isaac will endorse the Laurier manifesto.

BUCHANAN FUSION MAN. Lethbridge, Alta., Nov. 13.—An enthusiastic convention of the Lethbridge fusion and anti-fusion members of the Lethbridge district, Mr. A. Buchanan, late sitting Liberal member, as the fusion candidate last evening.

GRENVILLE LIBERALS. Prescott, Nov. 13.—Grenville Liberals today nominated Dr. P. A. McIntosh as the Laurier candidate in the forthcoming general election.

HAG FOILED HUN ATTEMPT TO RECAPTURE LOST GROUND

London, Nov. 14.—The Germans met with a complete defeat at the hands of the British yesterday in Flanders, the war office reports. An attempt to recapture the ground recently won by the British near Passchendaele was repulsed.

LACK OF REGISTRATION FOR DOMINION ELECTIONS FORCES VOTERS TO SEE THAT NAMES ARE INCLUDED ON THE LISTS

Looseness of Election Act Coming Home to Londoners Who Must Insure for Themselves by Seeing That the Enumerator Has Recorded Names.

The manner in which a Conservative Government endeavored to "frame" itself into power by means of the most puzzling election act ever perpetrated is coming home to Londoners.

Richard Bayly, returning officer for the electoral district, himself a lifelong Conservative, has not yet announced his list of 76 enumerators, whose duty it will be to compile a new voters' list, solely by means of whatever old lists they choose to make use of, together with a door-to-door canvass of the city.

There will be an enumerator for every subdivision in the city. No time is stipulated as to when these enumerators commence work. The matter rests entirely with the enumerator. The only rule that governs the enumerator is that he shall have his list prepared and posted fifteen days before election. He may use as the basis of his list any part of any provincial or municipal list in force, or last in force, applicable to his poll. He adds those qualified, including women, and strikes off those disqualified.

The enumerator continues to operate largely to himself. He completes, dates "at his place of residence," and signs his completed copies of the list fifteen days before voting day. Then he must post up in two places, one of them being "a conspicuous place outside and adjoining the main entrance to such polling station" (where December winds and storms may take a hand in the election) and the other place the postoffice—76 documents all in a row.

The enumerator must send a third copy to the chairman of the voters' registration board, and also give copies to each candidate in the election. After that the enumerator has nothing whatever to do with the list.

Every citizen aspiring to a vote must see that his or her name is on the list. If the name is not on the list, the elector must forthwith appeal, or if absent some elector in the poll must appeal for him or her to have his or her name put on the list.

The appeal of any would-be voter must be made within four days after the posting up by the enumerator. The registration board does not sit as formerly to register voters. THERE IS NO REGISTRATION OF ANY KIND. The registration board sits only as a board of appeal from the enumerators' lists. It commences to sit ten days before polling day, and sits for five or six days, according as the period includes Sunday or not. Before polling day the clerk of the board of appeal delivers to the proper returning officer the completed lists, who in turn distributes them among his deputies. The lists are then closed absolutely.

The dangers of this act will be evident to all citizens entitled to exercise their franchise. There will be no registration of any kind.

Every man and woman entitled to a vote should make certain that his or her name is on the list despite all the difficulties which stand in the way, and all the apparent looseness of it.

There is no registration. You must get on the list on the terms stated above.

TWENTY-TWO AND HALF MILLIONS ALREADY TOTAL FOR THE PROVINCE IN THE BIG VICTORY LOAN DRIVE

Ontario Coining Its Sympathies by Steady Stream of Gold.

Winipeg, Man., Nov. 14.—No figures as to the applications to the Victory Loan have been given out by the finance department, but it is admitted that the revised total of subscriptions from all centres of this province, reporting up till noon today, being \$22,536,850, with many points to be made.

NEW FEATURES. It is announced here today that plans are being perfected whereby the small subscription of \$5.00 will be paid for a fifty or hundred dollar bond and pay for it on the \$1 or \$2 a week plan. Another new feature to be brought out shortly is a postcard contract form, to take the place of the present bank contract, prospective buyers by its use being able to secure a subscription of \$25.00, \$50.00, \$100.00, or \$250.00, and which Lord Shalton, secretary of the Finance Department, says will be doubled if the country subscribes three hundred million dollars.

WINNIPEG DOING WELL. Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 14.—Winnipeg city's total subscription to the Victory Loan passed the \$2,000,000 mark last night, as well as could be estimated, and the total for the city was thought to be approaching the \$3,000,000 mark. Sir Augustus Nanton headed the list of individual subscribers with a subscription of \$250,000. The Canadian Fairbanks Company was the next largest, with \$75,000.

VANCOUVER'S SCORE. Vancouver, Nov. 14.—Up to noon yesterday Vancouver subscriptions to the Victory Loan totalled \$552,000.

TWO HUNTERS DROWNED. Port Arthur, Nov. 14.—A canoe full of water in all the trace that can be found of Del Moorehouse and G. S. ITALIAN LINE STILL HOLDING AGAINST HEAVY TEUTON DRIVE

Hun Battalions Badly Cut Up When Crossing the River—Enemy on Four Fronts.

Italian Headquarters in Italy, Tuesday, Nov. 13.—(By the Associated Press).—The Piave line still holds in the main against heavy and continuous artillery fire from the eastern bank and the efforts of the Austro-Germans to cross the stream. The attacks have not succeeded, but several battalions crossed the river on pontoons near Zenson. The Italian artillery concentrated its fire on the raiding parties, either destroying them in mid-stream or pushing them back on the lower Piave. The fighting here was desperate and sanguinary. Men who have returned from the batteries along the Piave say the German fire is extremely heavy but from middle-calibre guns.

THE GERMAN PLAN. Chief attention is now directed towards the eastern sector of the Trentino front, where it runs across the Asiago plateau to the upper Piave River. The enemy is making preparations there to either a diversion or a prelude to a heavy attack with the purpose of getting down into the valley towards Bassano and the plains below, thus separating the Italian army on the Trentino from that on the Piave.

Reports indicate that the enemy is operating on four main fronts. General Boroevic is on the lower Piave, General Von Below is on the upper Piave, General Krauss is in the eastern Trentino, and General Conrad in the western Trentino. This gives Von Below the task of trying to force the centre while Boroevic and Conrad press in the flanks. The Trentino wing. The number of troops under the Austro-German command is not known.

An Italian aviator made one of the last flights over Udine after it was taken by the enemy. He saw several large fires at separated points, and the hope is expressed that one of them was the city hall of Udine, which is a handsome example of Venetian architecture resembling the Doges' Palace. The Allied council is considering measures for the adequate protection of Venice.

JAPANESE TROOPS CANNOT BE SENT TO HELP ALLIED FIGHT War Minister Declares Lack of Tonnage and Cash Would Prevent.

Tokio, Nov. 14.—Lieut.-General Oshima, the Japanese minister of war, informs Japanese newspapers that the dispatch of troops to Europe is an absolute impossibility, owing to the tremendous cost, and the lack of tonnage. Baron Takahashi, former minister of finance, and one of the leaders of the Seiyukai party in a lengthy article in the newspapers, declares the Japanese army is deficient in ordnance and airplane equipment.

AMBULANCE DOCTOR IS BADLY INJURED WHILE HURRYING TO ACCIDENT.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—While on the way to a station for a patient last evening, the motor ambulance of the Royal Victoria Hospital was struck by a street car at the intersection of St. Lawrence and Craig street, and Dr. Halpern sustained a fracture of the left leg and a lacerated hand. His chauffeur escaped with severe shock. Both were taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital in an ambulance from the Montreal General Hospital.

DUTCH TRAWLER SENT DOWN WITHOUT WARNING.

London, Nov. 14.—An Amsterdam dispatch to the Daily Mail says a German submarine on Monday torpedoed without warning the Dutch trawler Hulbert at a point 25 miles off the Dutch coast. A Dutch boy of 15 years was killed. Ten survivors were rescued after being seven hours in a small boat and were landed at Ymuiden.

KERENSKY FORCES COMPLETE VICTORS IS LATEST REPORT OF RUSS STRUGGLE

Korniloff and Kaledines Said To Be With the Premier, Who Is Reported In Control of Entire Capital—Red Guard Destroyed.

Stockholm, Nov. 14.—Premier Kerensky has entered Petrograd, according to a dispatch received from the correspondent of the Swedish News Agency at Haparanda, on the Russian border.

ALL RUSSIA WITH KERENSKY. London, Nov. 14.—The Finnish Telegram Bureau says the whole of Russia, except a small part of Petrograd, is now in the hands of the provisional government.

The provisional Russian government referred to in the foregoing is the government of Premier Kerensky, which the Bolsheviks attempted to overthrow.

CAPTURES ENTIRE CITY. London, Nov. 14.—Premier Kerensky is now in Petrograd, and has taken virtually the entire city, the announcement of the Finnish Telegram Bureau says.

RED GUARD DESTROYED. London, Nov. 14.—According to these dispatches, which were received in a cablegram filed at Stockholm at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon Premier Kerensky defeated the Bolsheviks at Tsarskoe-Selo. The Bolsheviks are reported to have destroyed the Red Guard. The telegraph lines are now in Mr. Kerensky's hands, the Telegram Bureau reports.

CONFLICTING REPORTS. For the last three days reports have been coming in from Scandinavian sources of the defeat of the Bolsheviks by Kerensky's forces, which have been contradicted by wireless dispatches from Petrograd. This is the third time that accounts have been received of a battle at Tsarskoe-Selo, a Kerensky victory having been reported twice and a Bolshevik success on the other occasion.

HEADQUARTERS AT MOSCOW. London, Nov. 14.—The Finnish telegram bureau says Moscow is the headquarters of the Provisional Government, and that Premier Kerensky has issued orders from Moscow which have appeared in Petrograd, as well as the Helsinki newspaper, with Kerensky announcing that the Bolshevik movement is nearing its downfall. General Kaledines, the Cossack leader, is said to be dictator of Southern Russia. The orders of the Provisional Government are signed by Mr. Kerensky, Gen. Kaledines and Gen. Korniloff.

THE WAR SITUATION. Italian troops by strong counter-attacks aided by artillery have checked the Austro-German efforts to capture the Asiago plateau and threaten the line of the river Piave. Near Zenson, on the Piave, about twenty miles northeast of Venice, the invaders have succeeded in crossing the river in boats, but were repulsed in an attempt to debouch from the bridgehead they had constructed.

A Bitter Fight. The fighting in the region about Asiago and between there and Monte Cimone is very bitter. The Austro-Germans claim to have captured the defenses, only to be driven back by the force of Italian counter-attacks. Berlin says that the Austro-Germans captured, but Rome reports that the position here has been held against the Austro-Germans.

Between Monte Cimone and the Piave, the fighting is also very bitter, which probably was given up by the Austro-Germans to the straightening out their positions in this region, and the Austro-Germans are in contact with them.

Crossing the Piave. The crossing of the Piave near Zenson may prove a more serious menace to the Italian position than the advance of the Asiago region. The invaders tried to advance from the bridgehead they established, but were driven back by the river bank by the Italians. Further Austro-German attempts to debouch are expected, and unless the Italian defense continues strong the Piave position may become so weakened that it will have to be given up.

American Airman Active. American army aviators joined the British and French airmen in the attack on the German positions and also are doing observation duty.

The German artillery is very active in the Ypres salient in Flanders, and it has shelled heavily the new British positions around Passchendaele. This may mean either preparation for a strong German attack to regain this important position or an effort to forestall further British advances.

Mancheste Guardian Says the Allies Should Adopt the German Method. London, Nov. 14.—In commenting Premier Lloyd George's Paris speech the Manchester Guardian today cites the success of the central powers with inferior forces and smaller resources as largely due to "unity of control through the military dominances of Germany and the enormous advantage which comes from the power thus obtained of swift and decisive action."
