# PRISONER GETS

Jules Kennedy Escapes and

Was Allowed Out of Sight For

Jules Kennedy of Chicago (colored), a former porter on a Grand Trunk diner, who was arrested at 11 o'clock Sunday night, July 20, after being resisted arrest, and was sentenced to four months in the county jail on a liquor charge, escaped at 11 o'clock

this morning.

Kennedy was shoveling coal in the basement of the jail when he told Turnkey Robert Marsh that he wished to go to the lavatory. Marsh consented, but did not accompany him.

when another prisoner who was assigned to the work complained that he was ill, Kennedy was allowed out on condition that he was to be carefully watched. He has only been out once or twice since his sentence, and that was for a little exercise in the garden.

The governor stated that Turnkey Marsh was a good man, and this was the first prisoner he had lost. All police officials believe that he will be apprehended before many hours clapse.

This makes the fifth man who has escaped from the county jail in a period of two years, Elroy George being the last man prior to Kennedy's successful escape.


