

HALE AND HEARTY MAN READS HE HAS BEEN CURED BY FAITH OF BAD APPENDICITIS ATTACK

**Anthony Licciardo Explodes Sensational "Yarn" Appearing
in Local Paper—May Take Legal Proceedings—
Never Ill a Day in Thirty-Six Years.**

If the faith cure was worked on Monday, Anthony Licciardo, who has claimed Monday by a local paper, it was done at long intervals, and without Mr. Licciardo even being aware that he was ill, much less "cured."

"Mr. Licciardo was recently suffering from what physicians diagnosed as rheumatism. An immediate operation was advised. Mr. Licciardo, however, prayed over him, and announced with a calmness born of sure faith that in one hour he would be feeling much better, and that in three hours he would be back at his work as well as ever."

One hour passed and the first part of the prophecy was fulfilled. The patient slept after many hours of extraordinary agony, as gently as a little babe. Another hour passed and the

stating that he certainly felt improved. The third hour came around, and found Mr. Licciardo, it is reported, seated in his shoe repair shop as well as ever. The fourth hour passed, and the well-known shoemaker "is reported" to have suffered was nothing to that which he had suffered previously. The prophecy appeared in a local paper. He almost developed throat trouble explaining to his friends that he was not ill, and during his 36 years' residence in this country, and that he was absolutely well.

Some of his friends even went as far as to suggest that a "faith cure" was the cause of the improvement. It is chronicled the event, as it had evidently been compiled under the influence of the prophecy.

Mr. Licciardo will institute proceedings against the paper publishing the prophecy.

GERMANY WILL LIKELY TRY TO EVADE THE TREATY OBLIGATIONS

Very Unfavorable Impression Created in Conference Circles At Brussels Today Over Memorandum Prepared by Hun Experts—Step Is Regarded as Mere Manoeuvre

Brussels, July 2.—The supreme allied council met here today and began consideration of the program which will be discussed with German delegates at the meeting at Spa next week.

A very unfavorable impression was created in conference circles when it became known that a memorandum prepared by German experts regarding the economic situation of Germany and her ability to meet the reparation demands had been submitted to the Allied governments. The step was regarded as a manoeuvre intended to prepare the way for strong resistance to the execution of the treaty on the part of the German delegation at Spa.

SUBMITTED TO ALLIES.

Paris, July 2.—The memorandum submitted to the supreme Allied council at Brussels today was presented also to the British, French and Italian Governments at their respective capitals. It bears date of May 10, and was signed by experts, having been drawn up for submission at the Spa conference. It is understood it tries to establish Germany's inability to materially fulfill her treaty obligations.
