While London's water supply has now returned to a normal condition, there is still a possibility of river water from the north branch of the Thames being turned into the mains, if the approval of the board of health is given to the plan, according to Philip Pocock, one of the members of the public utilities commission.

Tumble But Wages Will Remain Same

Tom Moore Alleges Persistent Profiteering in Necessities.

Ottawa, July 2.—Quoting statistics to prove that there had been persistent profiteering in food, clothing and other necessities, Mr. Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, speaking at the opening of the convention of the Quebec Provincial Council of Carpenters in Hull City Hall today, declared that prices will tumble and must tumble, but that present wages to workers should remain the same. In support of his contention, Mr. Moore declared that the actual increase in the cost of making a pair of 1.015 in the cost of making a pair of 1-01s over 1914 was 13 cents, while the retailers were asking \$10 to \$12 for bcots that sold in 1914 for \$5. The price of bread, he declared, had advanced 7 and 8 cents a loaf over the 1914 cost, while the actual cost of latter producing bread had only increased five-eighths of a cent

Scathing Editorial Comment He quoted the prices of other necessities to the same effect.

"Even when prices take the big tumble that is sure to come, the manufac-turers can afford to pay the present wages and still make handsome profits," said Mr. Moore.
