HAMILTONIAN VICTIM OF MONTREAL MURDER

Identification Made Yesterday—Policeman Attacked by Friends of Woman Arrested.

HAMILTON, July 21.—(Special).—Constable Campaign had a strenuous time this evening. He arrested Mrs. Waldorf, who was making rough house in a restaurant, on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. Later Mrs. Waldorf's companion attacked him on the street and tried to scratch his eyes out.

Killed in Montreal.
The body of Michael Malone, junior, the young man shot and killed in Montreal, will be brought here for burial. Malone got mixed up with a bad gang, said by the Montreal police to be expert pickpockets. Some days ago they had a quarrel in a Laguardia-street optum den over the division of \$250,000 and it is alleged that Malone stabbed a pal, "Chas. Smith," to death. The next night Malone was shot dead, and this morning Smith was committed for trial on the charge of murdering him. Malone went under the name of Jimmie Enright, and his people did not know until today that he was the victim of the tragedy. An uncle claimed the body, and the funeral will be held from the G.T.R. station at 8.55 Wednesday morning. His people are all highly thought of.

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TAKE THE AIR LINE.

Already Planning Routes Thru the Sky.

BOSTON, July 21.—Passengers between New York and Boston will within 18 months be traveling in airships operated by American aerial navigation companies, according to an announcement by Charles J. Glidden, the automobile manufacturer, who has recently become an enthusiastic balloonist. Glidden says a company, permission to incorporate which was granted to-day by the corporations commissioner, will use either dirigible balloons or aeroplanes. Its purpose will be to manufacture and operate aerial devices and to establish aerial routes for the transportation of freight and passengers in the United States, Canada and Mexico. A rival company is already talked of.

RUBBER COMPANY RESTORES WAGES OF 15,000 EMPLOYEES
NEW YORK, July 21.—More than 15,000 employees of the United States Rubber Co., associated with 17 factories controlled by the trust, have been made to understand that business conditions have improved by an official order from the officers of the trust restoring the old rate of wages.

Since Jan. 1 the men employed by the United States Rubber Co. have been working under a cut of 15 to 25 per cent of their time, which was equivalent to a cut of wages in the same proportion.

ARRANGING PROGRAM FOR ROBERTS' VISIT

Will Be Escorted on Arrival to Exhibition Grounds—To Dine With the Canadian Club.

Field Marshal Earl Roberts will spend three days in Toronto, and it can be depended upon that Toronto will make it three glorious days in his already glorious life.

The dates now mentioned are Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, August 5, 6 and 7, and Quebec advises state that on arrival he will be escorted by the Toronto division to the exhibition grounds, himself riding at the head of the Queen's Own Rifles, where the civic address will be presented.

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MANY PITTSBURG SUICIDES.
City Officials Take Part in Conference—Twenty-One Die Since July 1.

PITTSBURG, July 21.—Pittsburgh and neighborhood seem to be in the grasp of a suicide epidemic. Since July 1 twenty-one persons have ended their lives, while a dozen others unsuccessfully attempted self-destruction.

The frequency of the cases resulted in a conference called by Public Safety Director Lang, at which the police and health superintendents took part. While the conference was called to take up the matter of trying to prevent persons committing suicide, Director Lang said there was not much the municipal authorities could do.

"When men and women lead a life of poverty and are indifferent to the purposes they are put in this world for," said Director Lang, "it is a hard matter to convince them that self-destruction is wrong. I believe if less publicity were given suicides it would have a tendency to check them."
