

NEW WORLD'S RECORD MADE AT OAKLAND TRACK

Royal Tourist Runs Mile and Sixteenth in 1.44 1-5, Beating High-Class Field.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11.—The world's record of 1.44 1-5 for a mile and a sixteenth was broken at Oakland today by Charles E. Ellis, Royal Tourist, which won the winter's handicap from a high-class field in 1.44 1-5. A field of five went to the post in the event, with First One the favorite. W. T. Overton set the pace, but in the stretch drive Royal Tourist passed him and won driving from the fast coming Dandelion. The pace was too fast for First One. Summary:

T. J. PROTECT FRUIT CROWEES

Legislation for Compelling Nurserymen to Sell Good Stock.

Farmers and fruit growers will be protected from the nurseryman who often fills an order with trees untrue to name, if the recommendations of the fruit growers become law. A special committee was appointed last year to draft a suitable bill. Their report was submitted yesterday and carried. By its provisions all nurserymen and agents will have to have licenses. The licensees are liable to cancellation upon sufficient evidence of wrongdoing. No nurseryman is allowed to substitute other varieties for those named, without the written consent of the purchaser. But the chief clause around which interest centered was the one which laid the nurseryman open to damages where the fruiting trees showed fruit other than that ordered.

One of the most practical addresses of the session was by Prof. Charles Smith of Cornell University, on the new work of the state in making orchard surveys and tabulating their results. This work had established the singular accuracy of the law of averages.

Several district representatives of the agricultural department discussed the apple difficulties of their sections. E. Lick of Oshawa handled very ably the question of packing and packages for apples. He claimed that character in the apple packer counted for more than anything else, and that the average apple packer was too careless of the fruit.

GET QUEBEC BANK ROBBER.
Was One of Four Men Arrested in New York as Vagab.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—When several Central Office detectives at once were strolling through Chinatown the other night, they were attracted by a group of men because they had recognized two of them as safe blowers. One of the detectives described himself as George W. Monroe of Cumberland, Maine, made a plea for freedom, saying he knew nothing of the men in whose company he had been found.

To-day Monroe, or as the police say he is better known as "Portland Faty," is in a cell awaiting the call of Canadian officials, who wish to take him across the border to tell what he knows of the robbery of a bank in Quebec. In the pockets of the prisoner the police found a number of certificates marked "La Banque Province, St. Raphael, Quebec, Canada." Enquiry developed that the bank was robbed Oct. 23.

Got What Was Coming to Him.
Edward Mulvaney, on suspended sentence by Judge Winchester, after a sessions jury had found him guilty of assaulting George Brown of Reid-avenue, in February last, turned up in court yesterday morning on a vagrancy charge and was sent down for 60 days by the judge.

No Assault.
Because he decided that Edgar Smith was acting for a customs officer to whom Robert L. Fraser, 59 Charles-street, a lawyer, had refused to submit his baggage on his return from Niagara Falls, Sept. 3, Magistrate Kingsford held in police court that Smith was not guilty of assault, even if he did lay hands upon Mr. Fraser, in asking him to go to the customs office.

SEEKS DECENT BURIAL.
Michael Basso Discovers Murder and Alleges Slight to Dead.

Michael Basso will go before Archbishop McEvoy to ask for a proper burial of two Italians, Leonardo Lombardo and Francesco Gallone, whose bodies were found in the Severn River near Coldwater, Ont., and according to Mr. Basso, buried in the woods in rough boxes, with no ceremony and with nothing to mark the place where they lie.

The bodies were found a year ago and shortly afterwards word was taken to their families in Italy that the men had been murdered. Mr. Basso went to where the men had been working and found that they had gone to the river after drawing their pay with a third Italian.

Shouts were heard from that direction and after a time the other man returned alone. He gathered up his things and left the camp. He has not since been seen.

Scarlet Fever Epidemic.
CHATHAM, N. B., Nov. 10.—Alarmed by a fresh outbreak of scarlet fever, the board of health yesterday ordered all schools, Sunday schools, public meetings and places of entertainment closed, and engaged watchmen to enforce this. The town has also been divided into medical districts, each being placed under a physician's care. In Albert County the schools at Hillsboro and Surrey have also been closed because of scarlet fever.
