TO THE COURTS

Ontario Railway Board Declines to Assess Damages. Judgment was delivered yesterday by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board in the application of the City of Hamilton to collect damages from the Hamilton Street Railway Company for repairs to the street when double tracking was laid. The case has been indefinitely adjourned to enable the city to go to the court of appeal to see whether the board has power to award damages for injury to a street by double tracking. The board hesitates to decide a matter of damages and advises the city to go to the courts.

CHINESE BOYCOTT HURTS

Japanese Trade is Badly Affected—"Crash" May Be Necessary. TOKIO, July 6.—Japanese trade and navigation are suffering heavily by the South China boycott, which is persisting. The Asahi estimates the annual loss to the country at many millions. It declares that the boycott forced Japan to yield to the Paris Island dispute. China, it goes on, is not yet satisfied and demands the withdrawal of Japanese troops from the Tatsu Maru claim for \$200,000 for the Tatsu Maru. The Asahi says that the Japanese government recently returned, urges that Japan yield. He submitted a startling table showing the decline of trade in all lines. Japan is unwilling to yield, deeming that such a backward would be derogatory to her prestige.

SUBSCRIPTIONS TO LOAN

Receipts of Treasurer's Office in June Totalled \$2,404,000. During the month of June the provincial treasurer received \$2,404,000 in subscriptions to Ontario's loans. This includes \$1,150,000 outstanding on a previous issue, and over \$1,250,000 on the new issue of \$3,500,000. This amount is 50 per cent more than was received during the first month of the public loan three years ago.

BAIL FOR DR. POLLARD

Furnishes \$10,000 Himself and Two Others as Much. Dr. Stephen B. Pollard was yesterday admitted to bail pending his retrial at the October sessions upon a charge of abortion. The bond required, \$10,000, forms the largest bail in the memory of the courts. He himself supplies half, while Alex. H. Wright, 413 Manning-avenue, engineer, and John E. Carvell, brewer, 28 Simcoe-street, supply the balance. The bail was taken by Judge Winchester yesterday.

Eggs Spread Consumption.

EL PASO, Texas, July 6.—That consumption can be spread by eggs, which many consumers devour raw as a cure, is the declaration of Dr. J. B. Howell of Tularosa, N.M., an expert. He declares a dozen hens were carefully isolated and quarantined and the cubic spurtum was thrown in to them daily. The eggs were daily tested. At the end of 60 days 10 per cent of the eggs showed tubercular bacilli. Something went wrong with the engine in the gasoline launch belonging to John Berg of 161 Grace-street while on a run Monday evening, and one of the party hit a match.
