Alliston, Jan. 10, 1910.

Not many weeks ago we published a letter from Ephraim Evans of Hagers ville or vicinity, finding fault with us for not quoting hogs higher, and for allowing Mr. Harris to set the market prices, which Mr. Evans stated were too low, as his son had sold hogs at a little country town for as much or more than was quoted on the Toronto market.

To-day we give a letter finding fault, as will be seen, for quoting hogs too high last Friday.

We are scrry for Mr. Rogers that he was not able to get the top price we quoted, \$8.25 f.o.b. cars in the country, but wish to again assert that \$8.25 f.o.b. cars at country points was paid, and \$8.50 for hogs fed and watered at the market also was paid.
