

ing on Scaffolding. City Architect McCallum has prepared an amendment to the building bylaw, whereby better protection will be

To Secure Protection For Men Work

afforded men working on scaffolds. The provisions are as follows: soon as the walls or structural steel on any building have reached the level of the first floor, the joists on such floor shall be placed and per-manently secured in position, and the

joists covered temporarily in a manner satisfactory to the building inspector. All buildings over three storeys in height shall be provided with temporary plank stairs from the bottom to the roof of the building. Outside scaffolds, either supported

by continuous supports from ground up, or upon thrust-outs from window or door openings, shall be pro-vided from the second floor up with tight plank floors and ten inch curbs and two by four-inch hand rails, thirtyfour inches high, with not less than two by four standards and braces, and when such scaffolds are used on buildings over 60 feet in height the space between the hand-rail and the curb shall be filled in with wire netting.

Planking shall be erected above scaffolds, over the heads of workingmen, to protect them from falling material or tools on buildings more than two storeys high.
All scaffolding or temporary sup-

ports of any kind which is or are used during the erection, alteration or the making repairs to any building, shall be of sufficient strength to carry safely the load to be placed thereon.
