Gunner Fred W. Errington, who lived at 450 Bathurst street before he joined the R.C.H.A., has died of wounds. He was 18 years of age...

Pte. L. R. Smalley, in the trenches since the beginning of the year, appears among the wounded. He enlisted and went overseas last August with a Q. O. R. unit.

Pte. G. H. Lee, who went overseas in October last with the unit commanded by Lieut.-Col. Jesse Wright, has been wounded, but to what extent is not known...

Pte. E. J. Bird, 274 Oyster avenue, appears in the list as wounded. His sister, Mrs. Gilbert, with whom he lives, has moved to 107 Perth avenue.

Pte. Sidney A. Fitzgerald, 465 Erie terrace, was admitted to No. 7 Casualty clearing station June 9, severely wounded. No further particulars are given.

Pte. J. R. Beorman, 124 Ferrier avenue, who was dangerously wounded April 21, has died of his injuries. He was one of three brothers serving in the trenches since last July.

HEAVY ARTILLERY FIRE MARKS WESTERN LINE

Germans Report Explosion of Several Mines East of Ypres.

Berlin, June 14, via London.—The text of today's German headquarters' statement on the military operations in the various fields is as follows: "Western front, army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht: Both in Flanders and in the Artois the artillery duels were intense only in isolated sectors."

Nothing of special importance occurred. A fleet of our aeroplanes reached London yesterday afternoon and dropped bombs over the fort. Good hits were observed during the clear weather. In spite of a strong defensive fire and numerous aerial engagements, during which a British airman fell down over the Thames, all our airmen returned unharmed.
