reason to believe, trusted Christ; others professed, about whom I am still in doubt."

Much valuable work was done in the way of visiting outlying districts, distributing tracts and denominational literature, and out-door preaching. A church was organized with fourteen members, to which two were afterwards added. There are still eighteen Baptists there who have not yet united with the church. In concluding his report our missionary says: "The great need of the town is an earnest, warm-hearted, clear-headed gospel preacher.

The preacher taking this town as a base of operations may win another district to the Baptist cause, and earn for himself the veritable title of

'Bishop of Algoma.'"

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Brother C. E. Lee was our missionary to Gravenhurst, and arrived on the field May 3rd. Preparations having been made, service was held in Orange Hall on the Sunday following. A careful search resulted in the finding of eight Baptists in the town of Bracebridge. There was a small church organized at Gravenhurst by brother Lambert some months before the arrival of our missionary. A Sunday School was organized with eight present. This soon increased to fifty, and the interest continued until the close of his labors there. About the first of August the brethren began to consider the importance of erecting a place of worship. A suitable piece of ground was secured and work commenced. On the 27th of September a neat little chapel, capable of seating about 175 persons, was finished, ready for
