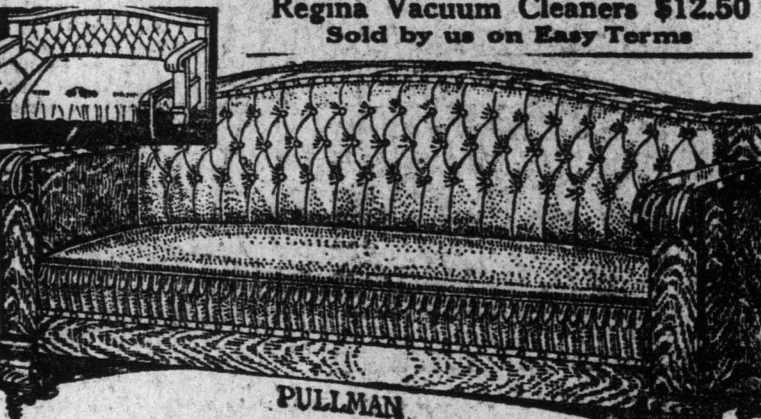

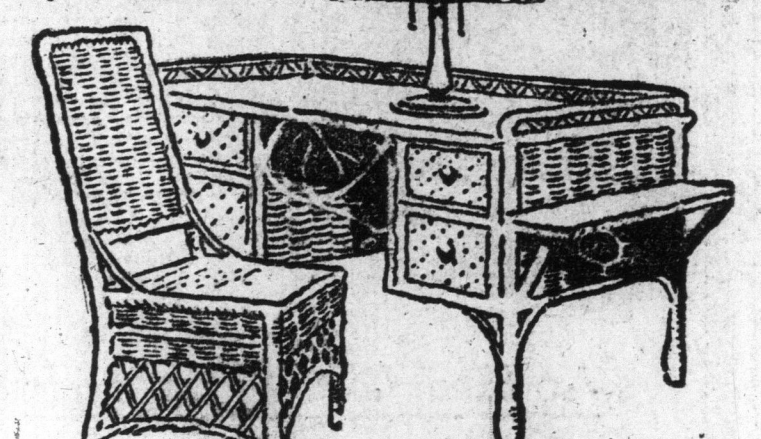

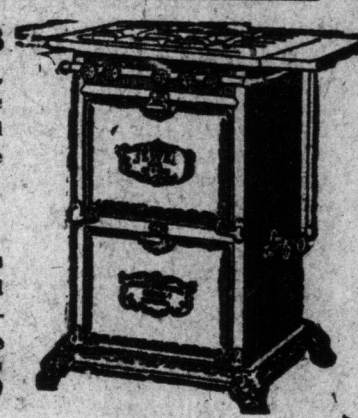

## PHOTO PLAYERS COMING TO SHOW

People That Get Out Moving Pictures Will Be Seen at Arena

Patrons of moving picture theatres, and there are many thousands of them in Toronto, are going to have an opportunity of attending an exhibition that will be of particular interest to them. The Moving Picture Association of Ontario, in conjunction with their third annual convention, which is to be held from June 20 to 27, are holding this show in the Arena Gardens, Mutual street. The show will consist

of a large and comprehensive exhibit of various pieces of apparatus used in the manufacture and projection of moving picture films, accessories, supplies and all the appurtenances that go toward the complete construction of a modern moving picture theatre. The various manufacturers of films who are taking space, and already practically all the leading studios are represented, will have on exhibit in the theatre which will be operated in the building, features that have never been seen in Canada. It is also the intention of the management to have some of the photo players whose names and faces are all so well known to Toronto theatregoers, at the show. They will come from New York, the south and the west especially to be present at this exhibition. There will be daily sessions at the show, morning, afternoon and evening and the opening Saturday has been set aside specially as children's day, when features of particular interest to the young folk will be arranged. Gordon & McGarry, manager of the

exposition, leaves for New York early this week to attend the big moving picture show in the Grand Central Palace and to arrange details of the features that will be produced here. The convention which will be held in the Arena will be attended by moving picture theatre owners from all over the Dominion. Over three thousand invitations have been issued and delegates from all over Ontario and from the neighboring provinces and states have signified their intention of being present. Important matters relative to legislation, censoring and moving picture theatre management will be discussed at these meetings.

CAPETOWN, Union of South Africa, June 6.—A party of 53 farmers, under the leadership of Johannes Adriaan Naser, member for Potchefstroom in the parliament of the Union of South Africa, left today for England on their way to America, where they are to make a tour of investigation of agricultural methods.

## MUST RECONSTRUCT GLEN ROAD BRIDGE

Bloor Street Viaduct Will Cross Bridge With Only Twelve Feet Clearance

During explanation of the Bloor at viaduct plans to members of council Saturday the engineers stated, replying to question of Ald. Spence, that the Glen road bridge must be reconstructed; there is only 12 feet lead-room between the two. The viaduct is above the bridge. One of the engineers, Mr. Taylor, stated the test borings discovered nothing but shale rock. This would be ample for a steel structure, but he would hesitate placing a concrete viaduct on this foundation. Of course the foundations could be made wider

and heavier. Ald. McBride asked if the vibration of steel as against the solid weight of concrete would not offset this difference in straight weight.

The explanation was closed and council met informally to discuss the Ver Mehr filtration plans. Specifications are to be drawn up and council will then deal with the plans formally.

## OTTAWA MAN ELECTROCUTED.

OTTAWA, June 6.—Harry Bath, 293 Carruthers avenue, a henchman of the Ottawa Electric Co., was electrocuted while working on Broad street, at 7.55 this morning. He was at the top of a pole when he touched a live wire. He fell head first to the ground, and was dead when picked up.

## FRENCH CATHOLICS TO HAVE CHAMPION

East Ottawa Conservative Member Says He Will Oppose Bilingual Regulation

OTTAWA, June 6.—Napoleon Champagne, M.L.A. for East Ottawa, and again Conservative candidate in that riding, in an interview with a local French paper expresses his intention of opposing the famous bilingual regulation, 17, and opposing every thing derogatory to the interest of Catholic French-Canadians. He declares that if Mr. Rowell proposes a vote of censure on the Whitney Government for the way it has dealt with the school question, he will vote for it. Mr. Champagne's statement practically stamps him as an independent Conservative candidate, altho he was the unan-

mous choice of the regular party convention.

## PANAMA TOLLS BILL BEFORE U. S. SENATE.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The bill to repeal the Panama Canal tolls exemption had the right-of-way in the senate today, with prospects that general debate on the measure would be concluded late today, and a vote on it taken early next week. The bill came up in the senate automatically, and was to be considered to the exclusion of all other business. Three speeches on the bill were in prospect for today. The speakers were to be Senators Cummins, Poindester and La Follette. Leaders were hopeful that they would conclude before adjournment today, thus paving the way for a vote on proposed amendments Monday, with prospects of reaching the bill itself Tuesday.

## FRENCH PAINTER DEAD.

PARIS, June 6.—The death occurred today of Gabriel Ferrier, one of the best known French painters, at the age of 57 years. He was a professor at the French National School of Fine Arts, and a member of the Institute.
