TO HONOR QUEEN VICTORIA

(Fredericton Gleaner, Wednesday.) After the meeting of Islington Lodge, Sons of England, held last evening, during which three new members were initiated, the special committee to deal with the proposition to have erected in this city a statue to commemorate the memory of the late Queen Victoria, held a meeting and arranged for sending out circular letters for appeal for funds for the project.

The committee has about decided to accept a design made by an English firm which calls for a statue of bronze upon a marble pedestal which will have bronze panels. The whole statue and pedestal will be about twenty feet in height and it is estimated that the entire cost will be about \$10,000.

HON. FRED PETERS IS ATTACKED BY WITNESS

Ex-Premier of Prince Edward Island Assaulted in Victoria, B. C.

(Victoria Colonist.) Angered because of the cross-examination to which he was subjected, in court, Walter H. Stewart, of Cobble Hill laid in wait for Hon. Fred Peters, K. C., at the adjournment of the proceedings in the libel action being tried in the civil sitting of the supreme court yesterday afternoon and made a violent attack on the lawyer, in the hall. He struck Mr. Peters in the face but the blow was a



glancing one and did little damage. By-standers interfered and Stewart was taken in charge by the officers. He was escorted back into court where he was severely censured by Chief Justice Hunter for his exhibition of temper and fined \$20 for contempt and bound in a bond of \$250 to preserve the peace for one year.

The assault was only one of several unusual incidents during the trial of the suit for \$500 damages for libel brought by Major MacFarlane against F. W. Garnett.

GOES OVER FOR A WEEK

N. B. Medical Society's Case Against Dr. Spangler Adjourned to Next Friday.

Those who gathered at the police court this morning to watch the proceedings in the case of the New Brunswick Medical Association against Dr. H. L. Spangler, osteopathist, who, they allege, is practicing medicine in the province without being registered, were doomed to disappointment, for on application of Recorder Skinner, who is acting for the medical association, the case was held over till next Friday morning at ten o'clock.

Mr. Skinner said that as the contention seemed to be that Dr. Spangler had been publicly practicing for some years and it was held that he was not a medical practitioner within the meaning of the law, and registry was unnecessary, the matter was therefore reduced to a legal question and if an arrangement could be made between counsel to work out the case along those lines, it would save calling witnesses. This could not be agreed upon and the matter will come up on Friday.

LIQUOR TRAFFIC IN CAPE BRETON

Men Who Get Drunk in Sydney Now Must Tell Where They Bought Their Liquor.

(Sydney Post.) There is something doing almost every minute in Scott Act circles these days and it is a dull morning at the police court when some drunk who has just come off the witness stand is not retained in a case against a local dealer in wines and other intoxicating beverages. Twelve cases a week has been a fair average lately and with no discrimination either, save that all the booze vendings have had the pleasure of swelling the Scott Act fund. Some of the people in this business are coming too fast and that if there is not a let-up shortly they will have to get out of business altogether. As one of them puts it, "When a man pays in three fines of \$50 and costs in one week with a possibility of the dose being duplicated during the following seven days, that is going some, and the paltry sum asked in larger cities for high license is certainly an easy proposition." As a direct result of the present method of dealing with sinners against the C. T. A. Sunday selling of the ardent has been practically done away with, and should the work go on in its rapid pace, inside a couple of months it will be impossible to purchase even a "sawdust" within the city limits.
