## THE BIG LEAGUES

Still a Toss Up Among Six  
Leading Teams

Red Sox and Dodgers Gain

Alexander Loses to Cubs; Giants  
Have Won Fourteen Straight  
Games; Yankees and Browns  
Battle For Fifteen InningsIt is still a toss up among Brooklyn,  
Philadelphia and Boston in the National  
League, and Chicago, Detroit and Cleveland  
in the American League for the respective  
championships. With these six teams  
fighting their way they have been to-  
gether some time, anything can happen upon  
the turn of one game. Brooklyn and  
the Red Sox are in their pet positions at  
the top of the league; the former is  
leading Philadelphia two full games and  
the Braves two and a half games.After completing the season in De-  
troit the Red Sox will go to Cleveland  
and if they hope to return home in the  
lead they will have to win the majority  
of games both against the Tigers and  
Indians. Detroit will take on the Sen-  
ators when they finish their series with  
the Red Sox, and will then go to  
Louis to win the season. The  
White Sox will have Philadelphia, New  
York and Cleveland as their opponents  
before the curtain is rung down.The race in the National League will  
depend upon the series soon to be en-  
tered upon by the leaders. The Braves  
have eleven games to play in New York  
and Philadelphia, five against the Giants  
and six against the Phillies. These will  
be played between Sept. 28 and Oct. 5,  
inclusive. The latter is the last day on  
which league baseball may be played.There is a lot of talk about Cobb fac-  
ing, etc., simply because he is not lead-  
ing the league in batting this year. Any  
player who can hit for 300 or better  
lead his league in stolen bases and be  
soley instrumental in clinching many  
games by his daring base running is  
"some" feeling star. Speaker deserves no

combined with his fielding, but he is not  
on a par with the Georgia peach.Alexander received quite a set back

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 18.—An X-ray  
photograph of Oscar Vitt's right wrist,  
injured yesterday in collision with one  
of Joe Bush's shots, was to be taken  
today to determine the extent of the  
third sacker's hurt. Vitt's throwing  
arm will be temporarily paralyzed, due  
to the shock to the ulna nerve, but he  
continued in the game. After examina-  
tion, Dr. W. E. Keen, club physician, an-  
nounced that he did not believe that the  
wrist had been fractured, but would

Newark, N.J., Sept. 17.—Reggie Mc-

world's record for one mile here this af-

Frank Kramer, the national champion.  
McNamara bettered the former record  
by two and three-fifths seconds, made

Cream of British  
Sportsmen FallCasualty List Contains Names of  
Men Who Have Made Their  
Mark in Every Branch of SportLondon, Sept. 18.—The cream of  
British sportsmen continue to appear in  
the casualty lists resulting from the ad-  
vance of the western front, the latest  
casualty list containing the names of  
many well known public school men  
who have made their mark in every  
branch of sport.Captain J. Vivian Byrne Johnson, who  
has been killed in action, was secretary  
of the Cambridge University Athletic  
Club and was a fine long distance run-  
ner.C. F. Marsden-Smedley, killed, was  
captain of both the cricket and foot-  
ball elevens at Harrow.The death in action of Lieut. Fred-  
erick Godfrey ends the career of a con-  
spicuous athlete on the football and  
cricket fields, as well as on the track.  
He established new figures for the armyin both the 100 yard sprint and long  
jump. He was the only member of the  
bearer party drawn from the Grenadier  
Guards which bore King Edward to his  
tomb who was spared to go into ac-  
tion.Several prominent persons are report-  
ed killed, among them Capt. T. H. Ir-  
ving, Lieut. W. Stobart, and Lieut. W.  
B. Todd Naylor. All three competed in  
the last Henley regatta.Lieut. T. Henry Watson, one of the  
best known amateur fast bowlers in
