TOLD TO EXPECT SOCIAL CALL FROM ALLIED FLEETS

Turkish Government Trying To Allay Excitement Among Constantinople Masses-Stay Brief is Promise

Constantia, March 31.-A special courier brings news from Constantinople to Wednesday afternoon. The city was calm, expectant and resigned to the inevitable. The government was preparing the inhabitants for the arrival of the fleet. With this end in view, proclamations were posted in various parts of Pera and in the mosques of Stamboul, announcing that warships of France and England may shortly arrive in the Bosphorus. The proclamation continues: "It is simply a question of opening up the Dardanelles and Bosphorus to free passage for foreign warships, which the Sultan and his cabinet have no national political significance."

The population is urged to remain calm and not to resort to any acts of violence and are assured that after a stay of three or four weeks, the allied fleet will sail northward, leaving Constantinople a peaceful demonstration. The phrasing of the proclamation would seem to make it appear that the forthcoming visit of the allied fleet was something in the nature of a friendly call, to which the Turkish government was looking forward to with the keenest delight.

The rift-rat of the capital have been rounded up into concentration camps in Anatolia, to prevent the undesirable elements running amok and looting when the shadow of the sword creeps closer to Stamboul.

Phanar district are in a state bordering on terror. Some by dint of bribes have succeeded in escaping, but the remainder are practically held prisoners in their houses.

The government realizes the danger to foreigners and Christians, and has delegated strong military forces to hold down Stamboul. It would gladly deport a few thousand Huns to Asia Minor, but dare not let in the resistance of an anti-Christian rising, would be precipitated.

The Turkish fleet is practically immobilized and in want of coal. The Breslau, however, is active and returned to the Bosphorus on Saturday night after a cruise in the Black Sea. The captain said he was unable to continue the repairs in time for the vessel to help dispute the passage of the allied fleet through the sea of Marmora.

Two submarines, brought overland in sections, are now in the arsenal at the Golden Horn and being put together by German engineers, but they will be unable to put to sea owing to lack of torpedoes.

RECENT DEATHS

The death occurred at Ottawa, March 27, of William H. Smith, formerly of St. John, who was 62 years of age. He was a member of the post office department in Fredericton. He removed to Ottawa in 1880 and continued in the civil service till his retirement. Mr. Smith was a son of Rev. Wm. Smith, who was in his 92nd year. He succumbed to an attack of pneumonia. One daughter, Miss E. H. Smith, who resided with her father, survives.

John H. Thompson, of Moncton, has received word of the death of his nephew, Oscar Thompson, in Boston on Monday. The deceased was twenty-two years of age. He was the only son of the late Charles Thompson, who was killed on the I. C. R. near Sackville some years ago. He is survived by his mother, who resides in Boston.

Lord Rothschild, head of the English branch of the Rothschild family died in London yesterday. He was seventy-five years old.
