## COPENHAGEN NOW A GERMAN DEPOT

Effect of Vast Imports of Food,  
Says Attorney-General—Prize  
Court Will Condemn Ships to  
Break up Traffic

London, July 15.—On behalf of the  
crown, the attorney-general, Sir Edward  
Carson, has asked the Prize Court to  
condemn the Norwegian steamers Al-  
fred Nobel, Kim, Sjomstjerne, Bjor-  
nson, and the Swedish steamer Pold-  
land, which have been detained for some  
time by the British authorities. The At-  
torney-General asserted that these ves-  
sels had been carrying absolute and  
conditional contraband from America  
intended for German consumption.  
In opening the case Sir Edward said  
thirty-eight other vessels with similar  
cargoes had been captured. Copenhagen,  
he declared, had virtually been turned  
into a depot for feeding German troops.  
The cargoes in question consisted for  
the most part of farm produce, meat  
from the great American packing  
houses and lard, which is used exten-  
sively in Germany in place of butter.  
There were many cases of products  
used in the manufacture of German  
sausage. Altogether no less than 25,  
74,800 pounds of meat and meat prod-  
ucts was included in the cargoes.  
On the Kim and Poldland were  
quantities of rubber listed as grain.

The largest hotel at Plaster Rock,  
owned and conducted by Washburn

were fortunately confined to the one

tors.

The Manitoba Conservative conven-  
tion at a meeting last night was pledged  
to a referendum platform embracing  
approval of compulsory voting, the ap-  
pointment of an independent auditor-  
general, abolition of patronage system  
and the total elimination of the spoils  
system. Temperance legislation was dis-  
cussed but final action deferred.

CANADA'S PREMIER  
ATTENDS IMPERIAL  
CABINET MEETING

Government Struggling With Coal  
Strike—American Packers Claim  
\$14,000,000—Allies Have  
Taken 450,000 Miles of Ger-  
man Territory

Sir R. L. Borden was present at a  
British cabinet meeting in London, Eng-  
land, yesterday.

A conference is to be held today be-  
tween Walter Runciman, president of  
the British board of trade, and a com-  
mittee from the miners about to strike  
in Wales. The miners are divided in  
their organizations, one wishing to con-  
tinue work until the conference has been  
held, the others holding out for striking  
at once.

Viscount Haldane, former lord high  
chancellor in England, was yesterday  
made the recipient of an address signed  
by 200 members of the House of Com-  
mons, expressing appreciation of his pub-  
lic services.

The American heads of big meat-pack-  
ing concerns are protesting to Washing-  
ton to take up with Great Britain the  
matter of delayed shipments of canned  
meats to neutral countries held up by  
England. They ask for a settlement for  
\$1,400,000 worth of their products.  
The Allies have taken 450,000 square  
miles of territorial possessions from Ger-  
many since the outbreak of war.
