WINDOW CLEANER
CLAIMING \$30,000

Fell Down Staircase Shaft—
Jurors View Place—
Allegation and Defence

Hearing commenced this morning in the Circuit Court before Mr. Justice LeBlanc and jury of the case of Herbert A. Guilfoill vs. T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., an action arising out of an accident which occurred in April, 1925, on the defendant's premises when the plaintiff, a window cleaner, sustained severe injuries from a fall.

The defendant sets up that the danger was quite apparent, and that the plaintiff, by failure to exercise reasonable and ordinary care, was himself to blame for the occurrence.

The plaintiff was on the stand this morning and during the course of his evidence adjournment was made until this afternoon to enable the jury to view the premises. The hearing will probably last a few days.

BYNG'S ACTION
IS CONDEMNED
BY PROF. KEITH

Authority Says Canada Relegated to Colonial Status

LONDON, July 8.—Lord Byng, in refusing the dissolution of Parliament advised by Right Hon. MacKenzie King, has challenged effectively the doctrine of equality in status of the Dominions and the United Kingdom, and has relegated Canada decisively to the colonial status which we believed she had outgrown.

Referring to the precedent of the dissolution granted Ramsay MacDonald after the Labor Government had been defeated, Prof. Keith said that His Majesty accepted without demur or delay the Premier's advice, thereby affirming the fundamental principle "on which rests our loyalty to the throne, that the Sovereign governs purely as a constitutional monarch."
