ONTARIO BRANCH OF LAST POST FUND FORMED. Toronto, Nov. 10.—A provincial branch of the Last Post Fund of Canada was formed yesterday at a meeting here when a gathering of public men interested in the welfare of veterans took up the question and decided that the last Canada can offer to the men who fought for her honor is a decent burial.

The Last Post Fund was established in Montreal in 1919 by A. H. D. Hare, but owing to the need for provincial organizations to look after the burials of soldiers whose families have not the means to take care of them, and the increasing number of deaths owing to the after effects of the fighting in France, it was felt that Canada should be put on a footing to look after its own men.

An application will be made to the Ontario government for a charter and steps will be taken to raise the necessary funds to carry on the work.

COL. GUTHRIE WINS SUIT. Col. P. A. Guthrie, formerly member for York County in the provincial legislature and prominent in military circles during the war recently won a suit in the superior court in Boston in which a large sum of money was involved. Col. Guthrie represented certain large stockholders in the New India Silver Mining Company which had gone into receivership owing to alleged mismanagement.

FINE ADDRESS ON IMMIGRATION

Mrs. Harold Lawrence gave an interesting and illuminating address on immigration yesterday afternoon in the Natural History Society's rooms. Mrs. Lawrence is the president of the ladies' association of the society and Mrs. F. B. Ellis the vice-president. The lecture was the third of a series arranged by Mrs. John Sealy moved a vote of thanks to the speaker at the close of her excellent address.

First pointing out the need of immigrants in Canada, because the native population is not sufficient to develop the country so that it might take a fitting place in the world, Mrs. Lawrence went on to tell how for every immigrant that had come to Canada from overseas, in the last decade, one person had emigrated from Canada to the United States, and she said that the immigration agents declared the cause of the exodus to be that women did not make the newcomers welcome in Canada.

Having explained that "immigrant" meant any one entering Canada with the intention of acquiring domicile here and was not a term of derogation, Mrs. Lawrence told of the operation of the immigration laws which excluded those mentally and physically unsound and those who might be a charge on the country. She told also of a woman's council having been formed to act as an advisory board to the minister of immigration and colonization in order to alleviate the conditions under which women arrived in Canada.

The women's board had asked for women officials at the ports of embarkation in England and at the ports of arrival in Canada, with a woman supervisor at Ottawa heading up the organization. These officials had been appointed and traveling women officers had been placed on the boats and on the trains. Hotels had been established across the dominion, and by a system of follow-up care the immigrant women were guarded on every side. The government had arranged for the sale of food at uniform prices and, on the recommendation of the women's board, had added to the contents of the boxes food suitable for children.

First in the World. Mrs. Lawrence related how St. John had been the first port in Canada to establish a nursery for the use of the immigrant mothers and children, where they might have the benefit of plenty of hot water for bathing the children or washing clothes after the long voyage. It was partly through the courtesy of the C. P. R. which gave up part of a room for that purpose that the nursery had first been opened here. Quebec had followed the lead of St. John, and last year New York had established a nursery along similar lines to that in St. John. A port nurse was in charge of the nursery, Miss Gregory having held that post in St. John with the V. A. D. as her volunteer assistants. The nursing service at the Canadian ports had now been co-ordinated, having for its head Miss Violet Tremaine, the nurse who had tended the king after his accident in France. Miss Tremaine will

be in charge at St. John in the coming season. Speaking of the necessity for giving this care to those entering the country, Mrs. Lawrence said that the impression which they received at the port of entry was the impression which would remain and what was wanted was to make the newcomers feel that they were welcome, and the country had a paternal care for them. She cited several examples of how women's care had helped smooth the troubles of immigrants.

In all, New Brunswick had received about 1,000 immigrants last year, Mrs. Lawrence said, and those women who had settled in sparsely populated districts had been very lonely. This was where the women's part should come in to make the newcomers welcome. If women would do this the problem of immigration was solved. It was because of this loneliness, Mrs. Lawrence said, that the government of New Brunswick was now considering a policy of "group settlement," placing eight or ten families together and providing a church, a school, roads and some means of lighting to induce desirable settlers to locate in the province.

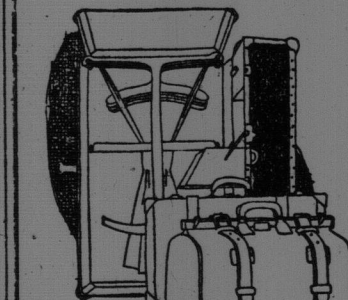
Referring to the bringing in of children, Mrs. Lawrence said the disposition of the government was to limit the number of agents bringing in children. In all 122 children had come to New Brunswick last year and had been adopted.

SAYS AIRPLANES CAN DEFEND COAST

General Mitchell Declares the Hampton Roads Tests Showed Effectiveness of Air Attack.

London, Ont. Nov. 10.—Hon. Dr. H. S. Beland, minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, who came to London to investigate charges made against the administration of Westminster Military Psychopathic Hospital, by a Wallaceburg veteran, who formerly was a patient there, has concluded his enquiry. Before his departure for Ottawa, Dr. Beland stated that in the light of his knowledge derived from personal inspection of many institutions both in Canada and Europe, he believed that the people of Canada have a right to be proud of the efficiency and excellence of organization of the Westminster Hospital. He questioned all of the patients except those in an extreme condition of mental aberration and found that they are generally satisfied that they are being done in their behalf. The conclusion was that the unfortunate man, who ran away from the asylum and subsequently suicided, was in a mental condition in which he was harassed by many imaginary grievances. Dr. Beland also visited the soldiers' section of Queen Alexandra Sanatorium for the tuberculosis at Byron and found that institution maintained on the highest standards, under Dr. F. H. Pratten, medical superintendent, and a staff of exceptional competency.

LARGE INCREASE IN NATIONAL DEBT OF AUSTRALIA.

Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 9.—(Associated Press, by Mail)—In his annual speech to the House of Representatives, Federal Treasurer Bruce, of Australia, disclosed that the Australian national debt on June 30 totaled \$4,210,000,000, as compared with a pre-war debt of \$1,685,000,000. During the course of his speech Mr. Bruce said—"The estimated revenue for 1922-23, totalling \$312,291,250, includes \$140,000,000 Customs and Excise; \$76,250,000 income tax, and \$49,040,000 Post Office, Telephone and Telegraph receipts. "The estimated expenditure is \$310,000,000."

"Of the accumulated surplus, estimated at \$34,514,935, \$16,000,000 will be used in the reduction of taxation and the encouragement of agriculture and manufactures. "The proposed reduction of taxation included the increase at the general exemption from \$20 to \$1,000 for all taxpayers. "Mr. Bruce announced that legislation would be introduced in the near future to reduce the salary of members of the House of Representatives from \$5,000 to \$4,000. Speaking on the national debts Mr. Bruce declared—"The gross Commonwealth debt, totalling \$2,080,382,445, shows an increase in the year ended June 30 amounting to \$1,752,480. The total national debt of Australia, including the Commonwealth and States is \$4,210,000,000, compared with the pre-war debt of only \$1,685,000,000."

Family Holds Judgeship 71 Years. Somers, Conn., Nov. 10.—As a result of his election as judge of probate, Ernest S. Fuller will step into an office that has been held continuously in his family for seventy-one of the eighty-eight years of its existence. The probate court for the District of Somers was established in 1834. The last two

judges holding office were Solomon Fuller and Charles Fuller, grandfather and father, respectively, of the present incumbent. The grandfather held the office for thirty-five and the father for thirty-six years.
