

COAL CASES IN COURT.

Six young fellows, charged with theft of coal from the C. N. R. yard, were brought before Magistrate Ritchie for sentence this morning. Bushfan, Cook, Bree, DeVeau and a juvenile pleaded guilty and were allowed to go on suspended sentence. Doucett had pleaded not guilty, and brought a girl to court to swear that he had not been near the yard at the time he was accused of taking the coal. One of the officers and George Cook formerly testified that they saw him there. The magistrate said he must consider his case separately on account of this fact and on account of the fact that he had a suspended sentence already hanging over him. He was remanded for sentence. ALL CANADA IN

In Port Today.

The best evidence to counteract the report published in the Toronto Saturday Night recently to the effect that St. John harbor was blocked with ice, was the sight of the shipping at the berths and in the stream this morning. Fifteen steamers were tied up at the docks and three more are in the outer harbor awaiting the tide to tie up. As a matter of fact the port has a busier appearance than it had at any, time during the last few days several steamers have arrived and cleared. It is thought that the present rush of traffic is due to the fact that some steamers were delayed in arrival by heavy weather in the Atlantic.

The sugar trade in and out is accounting for considerable business this year. The raw sugar inward has been fairly heavy. The popular trade in and out is accounting for which fifteen ships are scheduled for the winter, has also added to the trade, while the importation of United States coal has been fairly heavy. Five or six steamers have already brought coal cargoes from United States ports this season.




