Toronto, Feb. 7.—Edward Curtin, 35 years old, who witnessed a hockey game at the arena here on Saturday night, between Canadian and St. Patrick's, from behind over the bleachers, fell about seven feet and alighted on his head. He died two hours later.
Murray Cannot Go.
Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 7.—For their B. H. L. game here on Thursday night the Fredericton and Marystown teams agreed upon C. M. Murray of St. John as referee, but today word was received that Mr. Murray is laid up at his home at St. John with tonsillitis and will be unable to act.
Brown as Referee.
Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 7.—Frank M. Brown of Moncton has been agreed upon as referee of the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League game here tomorrow night between U. N. B. and Acadia.
May Go Outside.
Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 7.—The Campbellton and Chatham clubs have failed to agree upon a referee for the crucial game of the N. B. H. L. championship race to be played at Campbellton on Wednesday night, and the selection must be made by the president of the league. It may be necessary to bring in a referee from outside the province. Campbellton, it appears, suggested Stanley Staples of this city or C. M. Murray of St. John. Chatham replied that neither was satisfactory, and declared for Frank Brown of Moncton. Chatham afterwards suggested the double referee system, with Brown and either Murray or Staples acting, but in the meantime several Nova Scotians had been communicated with.

In fact, she is seldom seen in public except when walking through the woods or driving in one of her carriages or automobiles. She prefers dignity to display and her residences could hardly be called palaces.
