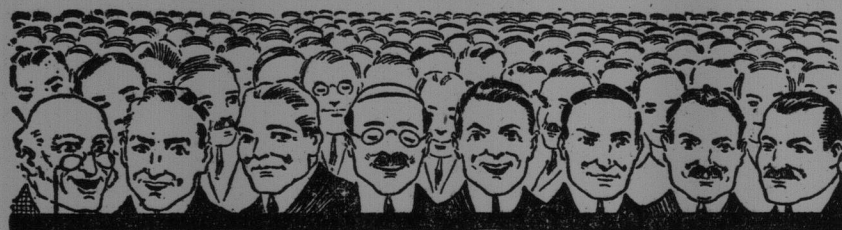

WEEDS.

It is a mistake to assume that cultivation stops when once the seeds are in the ground. As a matter of fact, the ground needs continuous attention and after rain it should always be gone over with the Dutch hoe, rake or hand cultivator.

For the amateur gardener weeds are really a blessing in disguise. They make him cultivate continually by hoeing or stirring up the soil, and cultivation is more valuable than fertilizer. The beginner is not always quite sure which is the weed and which the plant. Young onions, for instance, look very much like grass and amateurs have been known to pull up the whole crop in their zeal for getting rid of "weeds."

The best guide for the amateur, perhaps, is to look across the fence at his neighbor's patch or consult with someone who has been in the gardening campaign before. Persistent cultivation is one of the best ways to kill weeds and to allow air into the soil. Weeds rob the soil of plant food. They afford a haven of refuge to countless numbers of insect enemies and plant diseases. They cost the country thousands of dollars a year. They are enemies that must be assiduously fought and it does not do for the amateur gardener to give them any leeway. They multiply fast and propagate their kind.

MAY CALL CONVENTION TO DISCUSS HOUSING

Sir Wm. Hearst Tells G. W. V. A Deputation Housing Problem Will be Taken Up

It is altogether likely that a convention of various representative bodies to discuss further housing accommodation in cities and towns throughout the province of Ontario will be called for in the near future by Sir William Hearst.

A deputation from the Great War Veterans waited upon the premier and suggested the calling of a representative convention to deal with the problem in all its phases. It was pointed out by the committee that while 900 houses had been built in Toronto in 1916, and approximately 1,000 in 1917, the city had increased its population by approximately 20,000 during the last year.

A BUSINESS-LIKE PLAN.

E. A. McCurdy's plan for greater production in Newcastle has been accepted and a committee is working out the details. Mr. McCurdy's proposal is that a joint stock company with a cash capital of \$2,000 or \$3,000, be formed for the purpose of potato raising in town. Everybody can't dig and hoe and plant vegetables, but everybody can take stock in the company and its manager can buy seed and fertilizer and employ the necessary labor. Business principles are to govern the enterprise. Profit or loss will be apportioned to the stockholders. The main purpose, however, is to increase the food supply, and that will be achieved in any case.

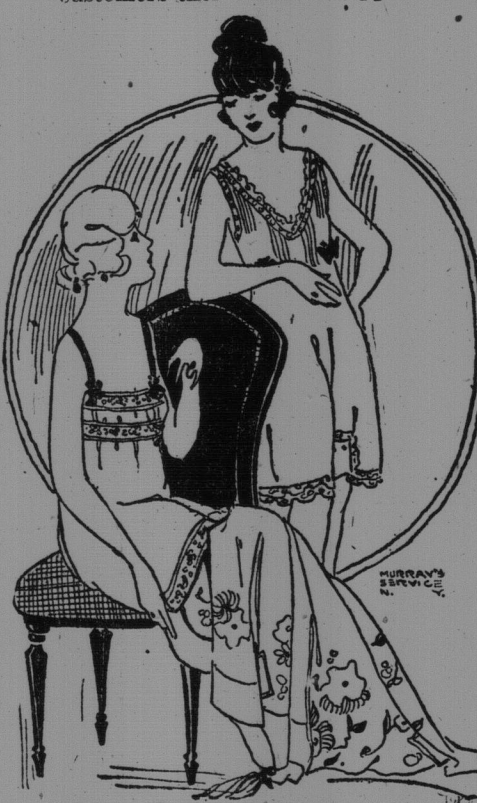
