WHITE PLAGUE 'CURE'

Paris, Feb. 8.—According to the Excelsior, Dr. Van Stackum, of Rotterdam, believes he has discovered a cure for consumption. He has reasoned along the line that if X-rays are efficacious in the case of lumps and cancerous skin tumors, their curative power is not due to their immediate action on the diseased parts but to the chemical substance formed under their influence in the adjacent tissues. The physician supports his theory on the well-known fact that the spleen of dead animals after long exposure to the X-rays has undergone chemical alteration.

His experiments along this line were as follows: He placed under the skin of animals stricken with tuberculosis a piece of ox's spleen and submitted to the action of X-rays the diseased parts of these subjects. Twenty-four hours after the operation a considerable improvement and after some weeks a cure could be pronounced.

It seemed difficult to apply this treatment to a human tuberculosis. Van Stackum tried to isolate the curative substance which formed in the spleen under the influence of X-rays. He succeeded and found the substance which exists in the form of grey powder is soluble in water. After this he decided to try this product in the treatment of people stricken with tuberculosis, and announces most satisfactory results. The ulceration disappeared not only when superficial but when deeply buried in some abdominal organ. Articulation was stiffened and parts rotted by disease were improved almost immediately. Cases of tuberculosis of the kidneys were also successfully treated and finally the bacilli disappeared from the excretion of those stricken with pulmonary tuberculosis.

HELD BY WINDMILL

Farmer Went to Oil Machinery, and the Whirling Arms Imprisoned Him for Three Days.

Harmony, Maine, Feb. 12.—Confined in the tower of a windmill while the whirling sails cut off his only means of egress, Edwin Pike, a farmer, was deprived of food and water for three days and nights, completely exhausted, was released only when the wind died down. In telling his story he said that several types of windmills having failed to give him satisfaction, he decided to make his own. He had finished the mill and entered the crank chamber through an entrance between two of the sails. The wind arose and set the mill in action, making it impossible for him to leave without risk of serious injury.

For three days, according to the wind gauge, the breeze averaged more than thirty miles an hour, driving the mill with such velocity that communication with Pike was impossible. Finally the wind dropped enough to make it safe to seize the sails and stop them.

ST. JOHN ALL RIGHT. St. Andrews' Beacon.—The outside public has somehow got the impression that St. John was being expensively governed and that she was behind the game financially. But the city chamberlain's report for 1913 puts a different face on things. It shows a surplus of \$105,000 with a record collection of taxes.

THE COBEQUID DISASTER. Bond Issue Well Received. London, Feb. 12.—The £1,200,000 five per cent bonds issue of the Canada Steamship Lines Limited, launched yesterday, has received pleasing notices in the London financial press. A much larger issue could have been underwritten as applications are very numerous.
