BRITISH VALOR IN INDIA

Story of Heroism, When Many Lives Were Saved by Havelock's March to Relief Lucknow

The tip has just been legalized by the supreme court of Berne, Switzerland, in a test case. A cattle dealer recently sold for \$135 three head of cattle to a farmer, but the latter refused to give the usual tip of twenty cents an animal to the servant the farmer would not deliver the cattle and sent back the money by mail.

The farmer brought an action for breach of contract before the cantonal tribunal and lost the case. The court finding that the tip was a "usual custom" in the canton, and therefore without it the sale had not been "definitely concluded." Not satisfied with the verdict the farmer appealed and the matter came up before the supreme court of Berne. The court, in the case of the lower tribunal and condemned the farmer to pay costs amounting to \$250.

THE KAISERIN'S ILLNESS

Report Says Cause is Taking of Drug to Reduce Weight - Society in London and News About Canadians in Empire's First City

London, Oct. 22-Princess Henry of Battenberg, about whom, by the way, an absurd rumor has been going about lately concerning her approaching remarriage is most anxious about her daughter, Queen Victoria of Spain. After everything has been done that can be thought of and many specialists consulted, her second son, Don Jaime, the final verdict is that very little improvement, if any, in the child's speed and learning may be hoped for. This has upset the queen, already in a delicate condition, so much that it has affected her general health. She suffers a great deal with her nerves, and does not sleep well.

Her mother would like to be with her, but, as you know, she and Alfonso do not hit it off at all, and the strain of keeping the peace between her mother and her husband would probably make matters worse for the young queen, so Princess Henry herself is a bright, merry little fellow, and the one of the three older children who is most often to be found with a book-not that he reads, of course, but he likes the pictures and will often spend an hour at a time studying them.
