LA MARQUISE de FONTENAY

A Serbian General and His Pretensions—Death of Three Cardinals

All the leading newspapers of St. Petersburg, including the Novaya Vremya, the Wiedomosti, etc., recently printed in that part of their columns devoted to official intelligence, the announcement that the government has forbidden "the notorious Serbian General, Tcherap, Spindrovich" from wearing his well earned uniform in Russia; while the representatives of the authorities of the countries in which they are stationed, that the man in is now connected with either the Russian government or with the Russian army. The Russian newspapers, in fact, do not hesitate to refer to frauds in the far eastern Asiatic provinces of the empire, when Admiral Alaxeff was victorious there, just before the outbreak of the war with Japan.

Spindrovich has postured with so much success as a Russian general, and as a Russian general, wearing the uniform of that rank, even at weddings, and has more over figured in France as such a persistent suitor of wealthy American widows and young girls, that this announcement by the Russian government will be of its effect.

He claims to be a Russian general, and in a letter bearing his signature now before me, argues that the best proof of the high favor which he claims to enjoy on the part of the Czar, has been his rapid promotion to the rank of general, which, he adds, gives him ex officio the right to be present at all court ceremonies and entertainments in St. Petersburg.

Now Spindrovich left the Russian navy with the rank of sub-lieutenant, and has never held any rank in the Russian army or navy since. He seems to have managed to make some kind of a deal with the Russian government, and to have obtained from the latter the more or less honorary rank of general, and thereupon in Moscow published a warning to the effect that Tcherap Spindrovich was selling Serbian orders of knighthood to rich merchants in Moscow.

This warning was reproduced by the "Berlin Tagblatt" under the heading of "Ordens Schwindler," which may be described as a man who swindles by selling bogus patents of knighthood. Spindrovich instituted legal proceedings against the Tagblatt, but although the latter welcomed the suit, Spindrovich never came to trial.

When Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria visited Russia in state a year or so ago, Spindrovich caused it to be intimated in the newspapers that he had been received in private audience by the Czar at the Winter Palace. An official thereof was published at the instance of the Bulgarian monarch by the Russian government.

Spindrovich is a Russian, and comes from a good family. He is a man of occasion, Colonel Spindrovich, holds high rank in that section of the Russian police, a power throughout the Balkan States. The society of which he is the chief stylist itself the Slavie Society, consists of barely three or four dozen members all told, and has no standing or weight in fact. It has nothing in common with the great Pan-Slavic Society which aims at the union of all the Slavie of Russia, Serbia, Roumania, Austria, Macedonia and Bulgaria, because of their common membership of the Orthodox Greek church.

The truth of the ancient Roman saying, to the effect that Cardinals always die by threes, has once again been shown by the fact that the demise of Cardinal Fischer of Cologne, was followed within the space of a month by that of the Hungarian Cardinal Samassa, and by that of the French Cardinal Oudine, Archbishop of Lyons. The fact that all these three princes of the church should have been foreigners, and that the non-Italian element of the Sacred College to such an extent, as to preclude the likelihood of the election of a pope, was followed by the election of the Italian once more possess a sufficiently overwhelming majority to preclude the probability of anyone else than one of their own number being elected to the Chair of St. Peter.

It is a pity that the saying about the members of the Sacred College always dying by threes should have invariably proved well founded. For naturally, whenever the death of a Cardinal is announced, everybody looks for the death of two others, which gives rise to much anxiety and alarm to those who have kinemen or dear friends among the scarlet-robed senate of the church.

NO COAL SHORTAGE DECLARES MR. BAER

Railroad President Says More is Mined Than is Sold

Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—Showing little signs of his long life, George F. Baer, president of the Philadelphia & Reading Railroad company, celebrated his 70th anniversary yesterday by working at his desk just as on any other day. He disengaged from his custom, however, in submitting to be interviewed.

He killed off rumors of his impending resignation by saying that the "old man" was "on the job, as long as he could do a day's work."

Mr. Baer declared false reports that had been published recently that the supply of hard coal is so short that a famine might take place during the winter.

"We are mining more coal than we sell all the time," he said. "There are 700,000 tons of unsold surplus stock above the normal consumption. There is no particle of danger of a coal famine. It is just idle talk."

CROPS IN WEST WORTH \$208,000,000 THIS YEAR

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 12.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce, after a comprehensive and systematic examination of crop conditions in western Canada, estimated the wheat yield at 194,000,000 bushels; oats, 224,500,000 bushels; barley, 40,000,000 bushels; flax, 12,000,000. The total value of the grain crop to the producers is estimated by the bank at \$208,000,000.

"In preparing this estimate," the report says, "the Northwest Grain Dealers Association figures of acreage are accepted. These differ appreciably from the government figures, but are probably more nearly correct. The average yield, however, has been calculated upon reports furnished by our own branch managers and managers of other banks, and these reports cover a district in each of the three provinces."

WAR FEELING IS SPREADING

Note By Powers to Turkey Declared Feeble—Reported Failure of Peace Negotiations With Italy

London, Oct. 12.—Only the most optimistic now look for a peaceful outcome of the Balkan crisis. From all the capitals comes news of increasing tension and continued preparations for war and this has spread now to Vienna and Budapest. It is true that reassuring statements have been issued from several quarters, but these without doubt have the object of stemming the panic of selling on the bourse.

The text of the note handed by the representatives of the powers to the Turkish government proves to be more feeble even than was anticipated and as it contains no suggestion that the powers will undertake to guarantee the carrying out of reforms in Macedonia, it is not likely to have any effect in allaying public feeling in the Balkans, which is all for war.

The reported failure of the negotiations for peace between Italy and Turkey, is another bad feature of the situation, as it is thought certain that it will encourage the Balkan states to ignore the warnings of the powers.

BALD JACK ROSE ON THE STAND IN THE BECKER TRIAL

New York, Oct. 12.—Gambler Jack Rose was the principal witness this morning in the trial of Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal. The trial went on as usual today. Justice Goff having expedited the selection of the jury, in using every means to carry the trial through with dispatch.

"Bald Jack" Rose, chief informer against Becker, was called to the witness stand just before adjournment was taken last night and there was a craning of necks in the crowded court room as the bald headed gambler began to testify, as it were, for himself.

Rose said he had known Rosenthal for twenty years and Becker for several. The witness did not look at Becker as he gave his testimony but the former police officer watched Rose intently. Rose spoke in a deliberate tone.

"Did you ever have business relations with Becker?" he was asked.

"Yes, I collected money for him."

"I object as incompetent," shouted John F. McIntyre, counsel for the defense. "Overruled," ordered the court.

Rose then told of meeting Rosenthal at Becker's in the Union Square hotel many, many days. A great number of offerings were made to Becker by Rose.

Rose said he met Becker again at his home, at the Union Square hotel, and Becker told him, he said, the details of the alleged partnership in the operation of a gambling house between Becker and Rosenthal.

James W. Moore Dead in Lowell—Boston Man Shoots Bears—King's Daughters Want Government House Restored

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 12.—Ald. Edward Moore today received word of the death of his brother, James W. Moore, in Lowell, Mass. He was a native of Sunbury county, but had resided in Lowell for several years. Besides his wife and family he is survived by one brother and three sisters. One of the latter is Mrs. Henry Miles of St. John.
