

TWO ARE KILLED BY MOONSHINERS

Louisiana Sheriffs Found
Buried in Mud—Slain
Leading Men to Prison.

Franklin, La., March 10.—Bullet-pierced and trampled by booted feet, the bodies of Wesley Crain and Wiley Pierce, deputy sheriffs of Washington Parish, slain by moonshiners they had captured at a still in the swamps eight miles east of here, were found buried in a shallow grave a quarter of a mile from the destroyed still.

The carcass of a cow had been dragged on top of Crain's body. The body of Pierce had been pressed down in eighteen inches of mud and slush. John Murphy and Gideon Rester, two of the men rounded up by a posse, are accused by the authorities of the crime. An official statement, credited to the Franklinton authorities, is that both men confessed.

Sheriff J. E. Bateman of Washington placed a guard of heavily armed men around the jail here, in which, besides Murphy and Rester, are confined ten other suspects taken into custody during the last few days.

The bodies of the two deputies were found buried a few feet apart, that of Pierce having been mutilated with an axe or some other sharp instrument. Tell of Killing.

The confessions of the two men followed long questioning by authorities, Judge Carter announced. The questioning of the prisoners brought statements that the two deputies had come to their homes Saturday morning, raided the still and placed them under arrest. Murphy and Rester were searched and the party started on foot through the swamp. At a narrow lane they were forced to walk single file. Murphy, said Judge Carter, stated he pulled a pistol the deputies had missed in their search and shot Pierce, killing him. He then killed Crain.

thorities brought to an end the greatest posse search ever staged in Louisiana, in which approximately 1,000 residents of Washington parish, including members of a troop of cavalry from Bogalusa, have been engaged since Monday morning. LEAGUE OF STATES MAY BE RESULT

It Has Been Suggested That
Canada Should Join—Off
to Santiago.

New York, March 10.—To prevent the principle of the balance of power from corrupting political relations among the twenty-four republics in the Western Hemisphere, as it is declared to have done in Europe for the last 550 years, will be the fundamental object of the forthcoming international conference of American nations at Santiago, Chile, Henry P. Fletcher, United States Ambassador to Belgium, asserted on Monday at a farewell luncheon given the United States delegation by the Pan-American Society of the United States at the Bankers' Club, 120 Broadway.

Mr. Fletcher outlined the eighteen topics of political and economic import, chief among which is a proposal for a league of American states, excluding Canada, which are on the programme for discussion at the conference. Explaining its aims, he said that the interest of this country in Europe, though justifiable, ought not to be exclusive, since the United States has a great and rapidly increasing commercial interest in Latin America. For the first time he said, political problems dealing with measures that tend toward closer association of the American republics are to engage the attention of an international conference.

Says Responsibility Exists
"As Americans we have, I think, not only a great opportunity," he went on, "but a great responsibility in our relations with Latin America. Since the time of Charles V, the principle of the balance of power has been the dominating one in the politics of Europe and still is despite the League of Nations. Hitherto that principle has not taken root on this side of the Atlantic. It depends on us whether it shall or not. It is very necessary for us to conduct ourselves that there will be no need for the organization of groups to counteract and resist the United States."

Chief among the other matters which are to be taken up are: Action on negotiations begun by the last conference in regard to copyrights and trade-marks, the reorganization of the Pan-American Union, decision upon the Pan-American agreement looking to co-operation on ocean and land and air transportation, interpretation of maritime law, classification of passports, study of agricultural problems, means of combating diseases of animal and plant life, reduction and limitation of the rights of aliens. Last on the programme, called Article 18, is the consideration of measures to bring about prohibition.

Former Senator Pomerene Speaks
Former Senator Atlee Pomerene of Ohio, a member of the delegation, also spoke on the necessity for greater political and commercial solidarity among the twenty-one Republics attending the conference. The other members of the delegation which has sailed for Santiago are Senator Frank B. Kellogg of Minnesota; Dr. George E. Vincent, of the Rockefeller Foundation; Willard Saulsbury, Frank Farridge, William E. Fowler and Dr. L. S. Rowe, director general of the Pan-American Union. Severo Mallet-Prevost presided at the luncheon.

The conference, the fifth of the kind ever held and the first since 1910, begins March 25. It was to have been placed in 1914, but was postponed because of the war. The first was held in Washington in 1895, and the others

SEES "GREAT-LAKES-TO-SEA" ROUTE INEVITABLE

Senator Lenroot Tells Cleveland Folk
It Will Come Within Decade.

Cleveland, March 10.—Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin, speaking at a chamber of commerce luncheon said that the Great Lakes water route to the sea project cannot be stopped by the selfish interests of Buffalo and New York city, and that within 10 years he expected to see the flags of every nation flying at the mastsheads of ships in Cleveland's harbor.

"Canada and this nation will soon agree to begin the construction of this great project and it will take only seven years to complete it, making ocean ports of every city on the Great Lakes," he declared.

The Wisconsin senator explained how the waterway would reduce transportation costs and make the Great Lakes the gateway for exports from the middle West to Europe.

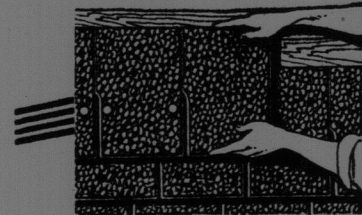
