## Notice to Fishermen, Coasters and Pilots.

The following sections of an Act relating to the Coast Fisheries, &c., are published for the information of Fishermen, Coasters and Pilots:  
Sec. XXI.—The owner of every vessel or boat under the burden of fifteen tons belonging to this Province, and employed in fishing, coasting, or piloting, shall furnish a written description of the same, together with his own name, place of abode, and occupation, to the chief officer of the Provincial Treasury of the district wherein the vessel resides; such officer shall thereupon grant to the owner a certificate, that the requisite description has been filed with him, and that a certain number has been fixed thereon; which number shall thereafter be painted conspicuously on both bows in figures not less than nine inches in length, and on the mainmast of such vessel or boat in figures not less than three feet in length.  
XXII.—Vessels or boats belonging to owners residing within the Bay of Fundy, shall be distinguished by numbers in red on the bows and mainmast.  
XXIII.—Every vessel or boat under the burden of fifteen tons, belonging to this Province, and found fishing, coasting or piloting near its shores, without bearing a distinguishing number on the bows and mainmast, as above provided, shall be seized and detained until properly numbered, and until the payment of a fine not exceeding five pounds.

## PRESENT.

His Excellency the Governor General in

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Excellency in Council that it is advisable and expedient that no Tolls should be levied on Coal passing upwards through the public works of the Province, known as the St. Lawrence Canal, the Champlain Canal, the St. Charles Canal, the Burlington Bay Canal, the Ottawa Canal or Ottawa Canals, or St. Ann's Lock, or either of them;

And whereas by the 58th section of the Act 31 Vic. Chap. 12, intitled: "An Act respecting the Public Works of Canada," it is in effect enacted, that the Governor may, by Order in Council, impose and authorize the collection of dues or tolls on Canals and other public works vested in Her Majesty, and from time to time, in like manner, may alter or change such dues or tolls; and may declare the exemptions therefrom;

His Excellency in Council, on the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs and under the authority aforesaid, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after this day, Coal passing upwards through the public works of the Province, known as the St. Lawrence Canal, the Champlain Canal, the St. Charles Canal, the Burlington Bay Canal, the Ottawa Canal or Ottawa Canals, or St. Ann's Lock, or either of them, shall be exempt from the payment of Canal Tolls.

And it is further ordered that the Order in Council of the 24th day of May, 1869, be and the same is hereby cancelled.
