WILKES-BARRE, Pa., May 3.—Frank Baroux, of Pittston, who yesterday deserted Miss Veronica Luszetsky at the altar of St. Casimir's Church, and was later mobbed by her friends and rescued by the police, changed his mind today and married the girl.

WOMAN IS BURIED IN

A HUGE HOLLOW STONE

Doctor's Wife, Converted to Strange Faith,
Has Unique Funeral in Iowa.

CENTREVILLE, Iowa, May 3.—There took place yesterday the strangest funeral even seen in those parts, when Mrs. Amos Patterson's remains were laid at rest.

After the body had been washed in olive oil it was placed in one of two deep niches made in a huge hollow stone, the other being intended for Dr. Patterson, her husband, upon his demise. The stone coffin was covered with a stone lid and buried.

Several years ago Dr. and Mrs. Patterson travelled extensively in the Holy Land. When they returned they were enthusiastic advocates of a new cult, which demanded the burial method described. The Pattersons are wealthy, and were never regarded as fanatical, but they have been unable to draw any adherents to their strange faith. The immense stone for the double coffin was purchased six months ago.

LIMER SIGHTS THREE

MASTER DERELICT

Wireless to Halifax That Wreck Is South
of Sable Island, With No Signs
of Life on Board.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 3.—The Hamburg-American liner, the Bluebird, bound for New York, sent a Marconi telegram this evening via Sable Island to the Dominion Government, marine department at Halifax, that she had passed a three masted water-jogged schooner. The vessel's three masts were standing and she had reefed mainsail and jib still standing. The weather has been very thick and the Bluebird has not seen the sun for 72 hours when she came across the derelict, having been proceeding under dead reckoning. It was not possible therefore to get a first observation, but they made out the location of the schooner to be latitude 41.23 north, longitude 58.53 west. The schooner is about 130 miles south of Sable Island. No signs of life aboard were visible.

SALISBURY LAD

NEARLY DROWNED

Fell off Railway Bridge into River But Was
Rescued in Nick of Time—W. R.

Wright Thrown from Horse
and Injured

SALISBURY, N. B., May 3.—W. R. Wright, of the Wright Lumber Company, was badly hurt this afternoon. Mr. Wright was in the saddle when his horse became unmanageable and threw him off. Charles Taylor happened along soon after the accident and brought the injured man in to Dr. C. A. King's office here, where he received the necessary medical aid. He was badly cut about the face and received a severe shaking up.

Earlier in the day a young son of Calvin Wheaton nearly lost his life. He, with a number of older boys, went down to the Pettedoc river and this little lad went on the Albert Railway bridge and fell off into the river, a distance of about twenty feet. His cousin, Clarence Wheaton, and George Wortman, succeeded in rescuing him, but it was a very close call.

CUBAN POLICE CORRUPT.

General Del Castillo Says Governor
Magon Has so Expressed Himself.

HAVANA, May 4.—General Llanza del Castillo yesterday handed Governor Magon a protest against outrages committed upon citizens by police officers. He stated that a most careful investigation be inaugurated to show the facts.

According to General del Castillo's statement to the reporters, Governor Magon informed him that he, too, knew of outrages committed by the police, and that he understood that the force is in large part rotten, and that he will forward the protest to the department of government with a recommendation that it be given prompt attention.
