

WILL RESIST JAP LABOR BY FORCE OF ARMS

General Labor Strike May Be Called All Over Canada--B. C. Situation is Serious.

Hamar Greenwood, M.P., Points Out the Danger of War With Japan--Mayor of Vancouver Appeals to Laurier Regarding the Arrival of Nine Hundred Hindus.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 13--Effort is being made by the civic authorities to ascribe the demonstration against the Japanese to hoodlums of the city and agitators from the United States. While there is no doubt that the rough element did the work of destruction, it is also a fact that every labor unionist in the city is pledged to resist entrance of any more yellow laborers, and they will resort to force if necessary.

yet. The government is of the opinion that the destructive work of the mob should be paid for. The first claim will be against the city of Vancouver and the province of British Columbia. The following telegram, which was delayed in transmission, was received by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, dated Sept. 11: "Nine hundred Hindus arrived today, steamer Montague; neither recommendation nor employment for them, nor is it possible to house them under sanitary conditions. Shall we house them in drill hall at Dominion Government's expense?"

MONCTON ALSO HAS TROUBLE

MONCTON, Sept. 13--The hospital board held a lengthy meeting this evening for the purpose of hearing any complaints or charges in connection with the management of the hospital. The action was taken as a result of the newspaper report to the effect that many people considered, in view of the complaints made, that a commission should be appointed to investigate the local hospital affairs, but no one appeared to formulate charges and the board had difficulty in finding anything tangible to act upon.

One doctor who was called upon stated that things were unpleasant for him at the hospital, but he declined to say in what particular or prefer any charge, saying he would not have his private patients dragged through the mire in trying to prove it. The board, he said, should find out why those studying for nurses were leaving the hospital, and in this way get at the grievances. As the board desired to act at any grievances imaginary or real it was decided to write three young ladies who recently left the training home and find out their reasons for so doing. One of them stated in her resignation that she was dissatisfied. In view of this the board decided to commission to investigate any charges any one might formulate, but as there was nothing at present to investigate no action along this line was taken. It was decided to endeavor to have the newspaper report rectified or have parties circulating the report come forward and make specific charges.

EMPERESS OF BRITAIN'S FINE PERFORMANCE

MONTREAL, Sept. 13--The Canadian Pacific Railway Company's R. M. S. Empress of Britain, which left Liverpool just 24 hours before the Lusitania, landed passengers and mails at Rimouski yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, exactly 20 hours before the mails of the Lusitania were landed at New York. Had the Empress sailed from Montreal, the mail port, at the north of Ireland, relatively the same as Queenstown is at the south of Ireland, the time from that place to Rimouski would have been 5 days 5 hours and 10 minutes. Although not as fleet keeled as her sister ship, the Empress of Ireland, the Empress of Britain's performance is considered a very fine one. Passengers travelling with the mails via the Empress of Britain left London last Friday and would be in Chicago tonight.

Mrs. S. T. Seed, engineer of No. 1 fire engine, has suffered a great loss by the death of his wife, which occurred at a late hour last night. The deceased was a daughter of John Riley, formerly of this city, but now of Salisbury. She had been ill only since Wednesday and her death was quite unexpected. An operation was necessary, and she did not rally from the shock. Four small children are left motherless, three girls and one boy.

HARSH CRITICISM OF CANADIAN POLICY

British Paper Denounces the New French Treaty.

Says it will be a Most Brazen, Unthinkable Infringement of the Royal Prerogative.

LONDON, Sept. 13--The Hon. W. S. Fielding, who has been in London this week on business connected with the Franco-Canadian treaty, has returned to Paris. Asked regarding the treaty negotiations, he replied that although they are progressing favorably, they were not closed and therefore he was not free to make any statement as to the terms of the proposed agreement. The statements that had appeared in the press purporting to give the lines of the treaty, were, he said, unauthorized and inaccurate. Despite Mr. Fielding's pronouncement, the press continues to speculate on the treaty. Several correspondents state that the stipulation requiring the direct shipment of Canadian exports to France, which is discounted in the Tupper treaty, has been dropped.

The Manchester Courier's London correspondent says there is an impression abroad that the agreement that has been negotiated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Canadian minister direct will be the most brazen and altogether unthinkable infringement of the royal prerogative.
