Bridgetown, N. S. boy writes from France two hours before starting for the trenches.

Bridgetown, April 27.—A letter has been received from one of the Bridgetown boys now in the trenches and who was probably at "Hill 60." The word indicates the spirit that prevails with the Canadians at the front in France, and propelled the lads up that hill and held it.

France, April 11th.
Dear Mother—I am now in France. I am pretty well and we are just leaving in two hours for the trenches. They are giving them all they want. It is hard to tell you how I get through this racket, but I am willing to risk it. If I go under all is well. If I could only knock out a dozen Germans I would be willing to go for it. I could fairly butcher the devils. They are just as bad as the heathens in the old times. I can't say much more, it may be a last good-bye.

On Monday evening the ratepayers were called to the town hall by public notice from the mayor for the purpose of voting on a further sewer extension from Hoyt's hill to the eastward of the town on Granville street. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 250 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unmined territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district. Mining in all cases to be made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,000 feet. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$100 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$10 an acre.

PLACING MINING CLAIMS ARE 500 feet long and from 900 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year. A claim may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent. after the output exceeds \$10,000.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, or in certain conditions. A habitable house is required and residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent as a homesteader. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside on and cultivate each of three years. Cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. In case of rough, scrubby or stony land, live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
