### Service of Sacred Music At Stone

Oratorio Selections Well Rendered by Large Choir Under Direction of D. A. Fox — Fine Solos Enjoyed by Large Congregation at St. John's Church.

A most impressive service of oratorio was held at St. John's (Stone) Church last evening given by the choir assisted by other singers. The music was under the direction of the organist, D. Arnold Fox and the choral work was characterized by the fine shading and sweetness of tone for which choruses trained by Mr. Fox are noted. Two very beautiful solos were "Oh For the Wings of a Dove" by Miss Ethel Paries, and "There Shall be a new Heaven and a new Earth" by De Witt Cairns. The four part chorus "Sanctus" of the latter selection being very fine indeed. W. J. Banbury was heard to advantage in several solos from The Crucifixion. The quartet "God so Loved the World" Miss Ethel Paries, Mrs. W. G. Harrison, W. J. Banbury, and A. G. Burnham was another excellent number.

The music was chosen from "Hear My Prayer" (Mendelssohn), "The Crucifixion" (Bach), and "The Holy City" (Gaul). Rev. Canon Kuhnig conducted the service of prayer and the two hymns sang included "Oh Sacred Head" and "All for Jesus". The congregation was a large one. The organ selections which were rendered by D. Arnold Fox were particularly beautiful, especially the "Meditation" on a prelude by Bach (Gounod). "The Soul's Awakening" (Mendelssohn) was played during the offertory.

Those taking the principal parts were Miss Ethel Paries, soprano, Mrs. W. G. Harrison, alto, W. J. Banbury, tenor, De Witt Cairns, baritone, A. G. Burnham, bass. W. H. Holder sang a part in The Crucifixion. After the service refreshments in charge of the Musical Committee of the Church and their wives, were served in the school room to those who had taken part in the evening of sacred music.

The death occurred at Nashua, Village, York County, on March 25th, of Mrs. John McLean, formerly Miss Bessie Goddard, of Elgin, Albert County. She leaves her husband, one son, two sisters, and three brothers. The funeral took place last Monday, and interment was in the cemetery at Nashua, Village.

Mrs. Fred M. Goggin. Apohaqui, March 30.—The death of Mrs. Fred M. Goggin took place on Monday, 29th, after a rather prolonged illness, due to a cancerous growth. Deceased underwent an operation in a private hospital at Sussex, which, however, proved unsuccessful, and on the ninth day following she passed away. 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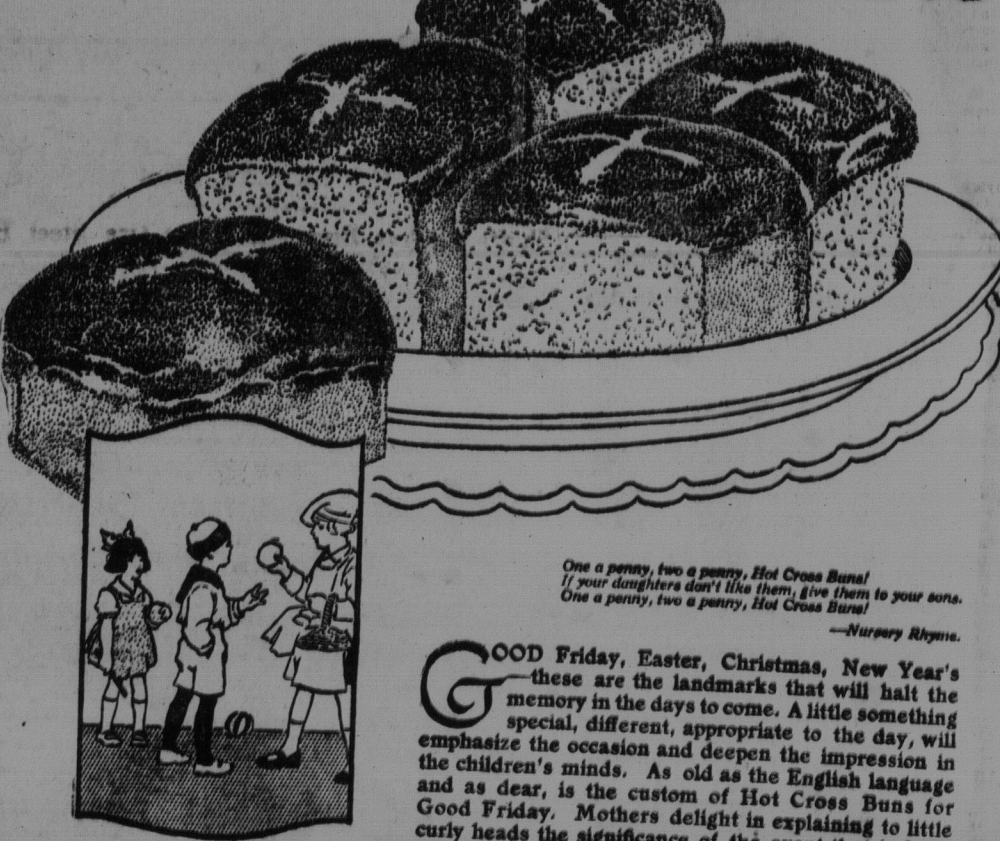

Take any ordinary bun dough and with a sharp knife slit top at right angles or pencil. When nearly baked, dredge the cross thus produced with granulated sugar, repeat glazing and dredging until the cross is filled with sugar. Complete baking. Glaze may be mixed with the sugar, or lemon extract.
