OBITUARY
Dressing illness, the late Mr. Gambell, Apohaqui, Jan. 6.—On the last day of the old year a former resident of this village, Frederick A. Gambell, passed away at his home in Sussex at the age of three years. Death was due to the dreaded malady, cancer, which developed in the mouth and slowly but surely won out over medical skill. During his prolonged and distressing illness, the late Mr. Gambell bore his sufferings with extraordinary patience and submission, which is convincing evidence of his strong religious faith, and his passing was a release rather than a calamity considering his condition in the last stages of the disease. Deceased was the youngest son of the late Isabelle Gambell and was born at Collina, Kings Co., on the 12th July, 1873, and was thus 42 years of age. Fourteen years ago he married Miss Mary Charlton of Welsford, who in the same year also bore him a son, who is also six small children, who can not innocently comprehend their great loss in a kind and affectionate parent. His mother, Mrs. Isabelle Gambell of this place also is left to mourn and three sisters, viz: Mrs. Frank Dyer of Cambridge, England; Mrs. John McOne of Montreal; Mrs. Samuel Barton of St. John; and two brothers, Isaac P. Gambell of Apohaqui and A. W. Gambell of Welsford, also one-half brother, L. R. Wilson of Vancouver. The late respected gentleman was a devout Salvationist, and it was with the burial rites of the Salvation Army, which the funeral was conducted. On Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock an impressive service took place at the home when Adjutant Owens of St. John, gave a reassuring and comforting sermon. Captain Lewis and Lieutenant Fraser assisted in the service and with much feeling and sweetness, Lieutenant Fraser sang a solo, "The City That Never Sleeps." The funeral cortege proceeded to Kirk Hill Cemetery, where the flower-laden casket was tenderly borne to the grave by A. W. Gambell, P. P. Gambell (brothers), Samuel Barton (brother-in-law), and Theodore Long, (a life-long friend). Mrs. Ellen O'Brien. The death of Mrs. Ellen O'Brien occurred at Norton, Kings County, N. B., after a brief illness. Mrs. O'Brien was eighty-two years of age. She was a daughter of the late Dennis Leonard and Mary Dolan, and was born near St. George, Charlotte county. She moved to Johnville in 1866, and in 1870 married Cornelius O'Brien, who died in 1905. The last four years Mrs. O'Brien resided with Rev. M. O'Brien, at Norton. She leaves to mourn one sister, Mrs. Winthrop of Houlton, Maine. The funeral will take place at Norton on Monday at 10 o'clock.

Meeting Yesterday

Appeal for Dressing Gowns and Bed Jackets to be Made.

At a meeting of the local Red Cross Society yesterday morning, with the president, Mrs. Frank White, in the chair, Miss Ethel Jarvis was appointed secretary pro tem. A motion was passed that outside circles be asked to send in some supplies of white dressing gowns and bed jackets. On the request of the president, Mrs. Richard O'Brien agreed to write the address of the ladies in making some needed supplies.

An invitation was read from the Knights of Pythias for representation of the Red Cross Society to be present at the dedication of the new Pythian Castle in Union street. Mrs. G. F. Smith and Mrs. Stewart Skinner were appointed.

Miss Frances Stetson reported the following supplies on hand: 1,489 pairs of pyjamas, 1,860 hospital shirts, 432 T handkerchiefs, 453 handkerchiefs, 454 personal sanitary bags, 2,005 handkerchiefs, 2,165 towels and other supplies of a lesser nature. It was decided to send fifteen skins of wool to the Red Cross, with the request that it be knitted up into sleepers or sweaters.

Renforth House Burns To Ground

Mrs. Downey Barely Escaped With Life—Loss Estimated at \$3,000.

K—Renforth House, 414 St. John St., a house occupied by Mrs. Downey, C. N. R. car inspector, and family, at Renforth, was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon about five o'clock. The house was a two-story building at the time, barely escaped with her life. It was necessary for her to walk about a hundred yards to the next house in her bare feet as all her clothing was destroyed. Nothing except a tool chest was saved, and the building was a total loss. The house, which was on the property of the Provincial Fox Company, is valued at about \$3,000, and part of the loss is covered by insurance. The building was consumed in about three-quarters of an hour.

Chairman of the Conciliation Board in Consultation With Labor Minister.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—John M. Godfrey, of Toronto, chairman of the Board of Conciliation, which will investigate the dispute between the management of the Canadian National Railway and employees of the system resulting from the "Hanna order," interviewed the minister of labor today.

It is understood that questions regarding the powers of the chairman and board were discussed. Senator Robertson stated that there would be no delay, now that the board is complete, in starting the investigation.
