Mr. Collins was not present at the time, but at the opening of the afternoon session he arose immediately and said: "Madame Markievicz referred this morning, when I was not present, to my name and the name of a lady belonging to a foreign nation, and I cannot allow that to pass. Something in our history as a nation a girl went through Ireland and was not indicted. (This was an allusion to Queen Victoria's visit in 1849.)

"I do not come from the class of the deputy from Dublin; I came from the plain people of Ireland. The lady whose name was mentioned is, I understand, betrothed to some man, I know nothing of her personally in any way, but the statement might cause her pain, and it might cause pain to the lady who is betrothed to me. I will not allow it to pass without a challenge, or allow any deputy in this assembly of my nation to insult any lady of this nation or any other nation."

Meantime work on two principal features of the conference involving technical details of the navy agreement and revision of the Chinese tariff system moved forward in sub-committees with a promise of early conclusion. The naval experts' sub-committee spent all day clearing away the remaining loose ends of the naval agreement, and the tariff sub-committee is understood at a session late in the day to have reached a virtual decision regarding the adjustment of China's tariff system. Before the meeting of the tariff body its chairman, Senator Underwood of the United States, died at the home of his wife in New York City.

Customs Officers In New York Made Big Liquor Hauls

Rouses Point, N. Y., Jan. 3.—Seizure of 177 liquor laden automobiles, eight horses and rigs, in which intoxicants had been found, and confiscation of approximately 2,000 cases of liquor, comprising all kinds, marked the efforts of United States customs officers working out of this town, in their attempt to break up the illegal liquor traffic from Canada. A number of seizures occurred frequently during the year it was said by the customs men. The officers are on duty night and day, and according to their own stories, have "quite a little trouble, such as having their cars damaged by bootleggers running into them, and being shot at from a distance."

Effect of Witbank Coal Strike Will Be Far Reaching

London, Jan. 3.—Far reaching effects will result from any prolongation of the strike of coal miners in the Witbank or Versenig districts, says a statement, issued today, by the coal mine owners, according to a despatch from Reuters' correspondent in Johannesburg, South Africa. A number of steamers are now waiting at Delagoa Bay for coals, some aggregating 18,000 tons, of which only one-quarter is available, says the statement, and a continuation of the strike thus reveals a likelihood of a serious loss in trade which would not be recoverable until after many months. The statement adds that if ships are compelled to leave without cargoes, this would result in compulsory reduction to miners and other people engaged in the coal trade.
