HALIFAX, Feb 9—The Allan liner Nu-midian, Captain John Brown, arrived at 3.30 this afternoon from Liverpool with the weekly mails, 12 cabin, 29 second the weekly mails, 12 cabin, 29 second cabin, and 57 steerage passengers, after an exceedingly stormy passage.
