THE CONGRESS OF AMERICAN REPUBLICS.

Commercial as Well as Political Application of Monroe Doctrine—Resolutions of Committee on Vessels Adopted.

New York, Jan. 22.—The customs congress of American republics resumed its sessions today when Dr. R. Alvarez de Toledo, delegate from the Argentine...

The resolution was that which declared that the Monroe doctrine ought to be extended to have commercial application as well.

The special committee, however, reported expressing sympathy with the resolution so far as the purpose was to extend and cement the political and commercial relations of the republics.

The report continues that the committee believes the matters involved in the treaty making powers of the country and the right of national charges on vessels.

Don Fidel G. Pierra, of Cuba, read the report of the committee on vessels, which embodied four propositions.

First.—That the congress recommend to the government of the republics representative, the adoption, so far as is practicable, of the uniform procedure...

Second.—That the government furnish to the Bureau of American Republics at the earliest possible date...

Third.—That to facilitate the prompt dispatch of the duty constituted authorities that instructions be issued to collectors of customs to authorize, on request, the preparation of outward cargoes in advance...

Fourth.—That the congress recommend that instructions be issued to permit the loading and unloading of cargoes during the night and holidays...
