G. T. P. CONTRACTORS LOSE HEAVILY BY FOREST FIRES

Many Camps and Powder Houses Burned and Immense Tracts Are Swept.

Fort William, Ont., June 19.—Forest fires seem to be raging all along the coast of the Great Trunk Pacific, and Foley Bros., contractors here, are losing heavily by the destruction of camps and powder houses. Three powder houses, containing large quantities of powder, were destroyed. At Sheels and Boden Lake two camps were destroyed. Both contained immense amounts of supplies. The camps were at Finmark and Bay of English.

MINISTER ATTACKS REV. DR. CHOWN

Declares His Charge Against Toronto Stock Brokers Was Unstatesmanlike

Toronto, June 19.—An attack on Rev. Dr. Chown, general secretary of temperance and moral reform for the Methodist church, by Rev. Thomas Campbell, was the outstanding feature of yesterday's session of the Toronto Methodist conference. When the report of the committee on temperance and reform was read by Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, made reference to the "sane and statesmanlike leadership of Dr. Chown" and suggested that the appointment of a field secretary to assist the general secretary was necessary.

SEVEN MEN KILLED IN A SCRANTON COLLIERY

Scranton, Pa., June 18.—Seven men were killed outright and two others seriously injured Tuesday night in a coal mine at Scranton, Pa. The explosion occurred in the Johnson No. 1 mine, at Priebrack late today. The first explosion which occurred about 3 o'clock, was caused by the careless use of a miner who by leaving a door open, allowed gas to accumulate in the workings. One man was injured as a result of this explosion. The second explosion, which resulted in the death of seven men, and the injury of another, occurred about 5 o'clock and resulted from the ignition of the deadly fire-damp which accumulated after the first explosion.

NEW TREATMENT FOR COAL

Said to Make It Smokeless; Tests by U. S. Government. Washington, June 18.—Recent fuel tests made by the government indicate that it may be possible soon for locomotives to enter cities without emitting smoke of any quantity whatever from their stacks. In the hope that there will be an early solution of what is perhaps the most difficult problem in the elimination of the smoke nuisance of the big cities of the country, these tests are to be continued in cooperation with the government fuel testing plant at Norfolk (Va.), and various municipalities have been asked to furnish the greater part of the fuel to be used. Manufacturers throughout the country have experimented willingly with smoke-consuming devices and have obtained adequate results, but the railroads have always proved a stumbling block to the elimination of smoke through the belief of officials that nothing could be done which would not interfere with schedules and the amount of work that must be done each day.

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
