NEWFOUNDLAND
Science and Art, Dreams and Realities.—One of the Peculiar Effects of Steam—Heart's Content—The Telegraphic Modus Operandi.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)
St. John's, July 21, 1873.

The successful laying of the Telegraph Cable has been the miracle of scientific ability and the triumph of engineering skill which some six or seven years ago it appeared to be. Science and Art have alike developed themselves in the path of progress. Science with a subtle brain has conceived the end, and Art with cunning hand has carried it out to successful practical results. In this path of progress while Science and Art necessarily precede the other, there seems to be no great gulf to separate the Potential from the Actual. Science may perhaps reach some loftier height than Science in 1850 and 1855 were but it includes the successful results of '56, '66, and '69. As the Laureate has fully observed,

"Others' faults teach us not,
Nor teach their wisdom teaches,
But most of sterling good is what
Our own experience reaches."

Their "own experience" has I happily taught its lesson to the great enterpriser of the Atlantic Telegraph and the light it may have been designed to shed upon the results, shall say it: the price was extravagant? Owen Meredith has told us that there is

"One All-Perfect who whether man falls in his way or reaches,
Builds surely itself up from our fallen days and deeds,
And so it is. "The infinite purpose of time" thro' defects and disasters alway but certainly evolves itself and leads men onward to new triumphs over Space and Time.

For I doubt not that the age one here, and the thought of the age are widened in the process of the year.
These observations are preparatory to the fact that the age are widened in the process of the year. I have seen very few visitors at Heart's Content; to see the arrival of the Great Eastern. I hope the metropolitan sight-seers hung back at the "fast sailing steamship Cabot," and it is not surprising that they did so.

For the benefit of our readers who are not acquainted with Heart's Content, let me say a few words on the subject. The settlement lies at the bottom of a deep bay, and is about 10 miles from St. John's. The harbor is one of the finest in the world, it is embosomed in hills wooded with pine, and presents an extremely picturesque appearance. Far in the western distance the blue hills of the opposite side of the bay are visible, and the French cable was laid in a trench up against the horizon. The buildings of consequence are the houses of the staff, but the place is thickly studded with fishermen's cottages displaying an air of whiteness and comfort not usually seen in Newfoundland. Truly a place with no striking significance, and yet without how essential to the interests of civilization and the welfare of the world. Fancy it submerged by some vast tidal wave, described by some great conflagration, or overruled by some mighty earthquake. What consequences, deadlocks and committal panics would ensue. Merchants' credit shaken, ships detained for weeks, diplomatic arrested in its course, the press deprived of its intelligence and political action fettered, these and other evils which cannot be anticipated would certainly follow in the train of such a disaster. Insignificant as the place may be it is laden with the destinies of the world.

It is one of the great manufacturing of our social cosmos, and if even for a day it should get out of order the result would be the stagnation of our whole economic vitality. But happily it is not now by any means probable that any disarrangement so fatal should be brought about. When during the past winter the '65 cable and the French cable were both broken and only the cable of '66 was to be relied upon, there was a great risk of this awkward contingency arising. But now two cables are again at work and there is every reasonable prospect of the '66 cable being recovered. It is still, however, a matter of speculation and experiment, and it has yet to be shown how a cable that has been eight years submerged will bear the strain of elevation from a depth of 1900 fathoms.

It remains for me to describe as concisely as possible the routine of business in the office here. Though the American has amalgamated with the Anglo Co., there are still necessarily the two offices with two independent managers. Both offices are under the same roof and separated by a partition with a couple of sliding panels. Through one of these panels the cable office passes its messages on yellow paper to the American office and through the other the American office passes its message on white paper to the Anglo staff. The operator of the American Co., which uses the Morse system, sits before the instrument with a block of blank forms before him. The message is copied in pencil upon a Receiving Sheet, and duplicated by means of carbonized paper upon a Forwarding Sheet. The operator notes upon the former the number of words, records the time (Greenwich) and initials the whole by his signature, and passes the paper through the slide into the cable office, where the time of its receipt is verified by the Check Clerk. The routine of the latter office is somewhat peculiar. In the reception of messages here there is always an operator to read and a clerk to transcribe. The check clerk notes the various particulars, already mentioned, and then passes the message through the slide into the other office. I have only to add that between the officials of each company there is a friendly rivalry, and that the gentleman in Montreal which appeared in your columns early in June. Want of time and space forbids me from further noting it, but I shall return to it again.
