The death of Mrs. Dugald Campbell took place Saturday morning at the family residence, one mile west of Cowal, township of Dunwich. She was in her 90th year and, besides her husband, she leaves six children, three sons and two daughters at home and one daughter, Mrs. Forman, of Alvinston. She was a daughter of Nathan McLellan, of Middleton.

A patriotic concert will be held in the Woodmen's Hall, Melbourne, on Friday evening, April 10th, under management of the Melbourne Agricultural Society. Prof. Wallace, of the Toronto University staff, will speak on "National Greatness." Other entertainers will be Ex-mayor Graham of London, Peter McArthur, Miss Tena Elliott, Miss Ivy McDonald, Capt. T. E. Robson, Miss Minerva McDougald and Andrew McLachlan.

The Glencoe Fruit Growers Association met on Wednesday of last week and among other business delegated their president, J. G. Lethbridge, who is also president of the Middlesex association, to represent them before the railroad commission to oppose the application of the railroads to increase the freight rates on fruit to the West.

The proposed increase, it was pointed out, would practically shut out Ontario fruit growers from the western markets, giving a discriminating advantage to British Columbia and the Western States.

Mr. and Mrs. J. J. McConnell, of Moss, last week received another letter from their son Jim, of the 90th Rifles, now in France. Jim writes under date of March 2nd that he received letter and parcel from home and was in good health. He had been in the trenches, but came out all right, and expected to be in them again shortly. The trenches he was in were in very good condition. The weather conditions are better in France than in England. He was not allowed to state their location in France or to describe the country, nor was he allowed to speak of any of the casualties.

Rev. H. A. Fish, of Owen Sound, paid a three-day visit to Glencoe in his official capacity as grand chaplain of the Orange Order of British America. On Friday evening he addressed an audience in the opera house, the subject of his address being, "Rome in Relation to the Mixed Marriages, Language and Public School Questions." On Saturday evening a joint meeting of the Appin and Glencoe lodges was held in the Glencoe lodge room for the purpose of initiating a number of new members. On Sunday evening Rev. Mr. Fish occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church and delivered a most impressive address.

The death occurred at her home near Longwood on Saturday morning of Mrs. McKee, following an illness of three or four days with spinal meningitis. Mrs. McKee was about 80 years of age and was a daughter of the late William and Eliza Cooper, of Canada. A sister, Mrs. E. W. Squire, of Ekfrid, died about six weeks ago. Other members of the family are Mrs. J. R. Squire, of Glencoe; Mrs. J. W. Naftzger, of Adrian, Mich.; Mrs. (Rev.) M. M. Bennett, of Moosejaw, Sask.; G. P. Cooper, of Saskatoon, Sask., and Dr. E. M. Cooper, of Carleton Place, Mich. The funeral took place on Tuesday. Mrs. McKee leaves her husband but no family.
