KLONDIKE STAKED

Bed of the River is Covered by Locations.

What is thought in the gold commissioner's office to be the finale of the stampede to the Klondike-Bonanza Reservoir group of claims on the Klondike occurred this morning. As was stated exclusively in the Nugget of yesterday the hill claims abutting the river had already been staked and the applications tendered, such, however, not covering the river bed or the islands. That portion of the tract from discovery down was staked late yesterday as benches 250 feet square and 15 applications for record were made this morning. They were received by Recorder Boyce in the same manner as the hill claims, refused and indorsed why such action was taken, which was to the effect that the records did not show that the ground was open to relocation. The total number of claims staked on the tract numbers 43.

INTEGRITY INFRINGED

Adana Liable to Severe Punishment.

Sent Congratulatory Note to President Roosevelt About Cuban Independence.

New York, Nov. 7.—A Madrid dispatch says that the trial of Sabino Adana, leader of the Autonomist party in the Basque provinces, charged with having sent a congratulatory telegram to Roosevelt last spring on the granting of Cuban independence, began at Bilbao today. The public prosecutor took the ground that Senor Adana's telegram to the American president infringed the integrity and dignity of Spain, and demanded a sentence of eight years imprisonment.

RIVER STILL OPEN

No News as to Situation of the La France.

No further news has been received in regard to the whereabouts of the La France, and Mr. Calderhead still thinks she must be on the way and not definitely tied up for the winter. It is reported that there are several stretches of the Yukon that are now as open as a clear of ice as the river is along the waterfront. The Stewart is again open at its mouth, but a jam higher up is holding most of the water. At the crossing, twenty miles up, the mail had to be carried over in a canoe on Wednesday evening, but the driver said it would no doubt be frozen and solid clear across by this morning.

DANGEROUS JOURNEY

J. B. Tingley Leaves for Ross River

Will Travel Overland as the Ice on the Pelly is Not Yet Safe for Mushing.

J. P. Tingley, formerly with the police force, left today at noon accompanied by an Indian guide on what will prove a long and lonesome trip of 1300 miles. Tingley has taken a contract from Sheriff Ellbeck to deliver the ballots and ballot boxes to the Yukon. How many voters there are in that vicinity is not known as no report has been heard from either of the enumerators—since their appointment and the poll books were opened. Robert Henderson, one of the enumerators, when in the city for the purpose of being sworn in stated that there were fully 200 votes on the upper Pelly, though such is not generally believed to be the case, and even if there were that number a full poll would be almost an impossibility on account of the population being scattered over such a vast tract of territory.

What Tingley and his guide have before them can only be appreciated by those who have made overland journeys in the Yukon, across endless expanses of trackless snow where every foot of the trail has to be broken for the dogs. The party started with nine dogs attached to one sled carrying another as a part of its load, the intention being to break the team into two as soon as the traveling becomes bad. The party will travel as far as Tanalua on the new Whitehorse road and then proceed up the Yukon until Little Salmon is reached. The latter will be ascended a short distance and then the route will be overland and directly across country to Ross river without a trail or a blaze to guide. If heavy snow is encountered trail will have to be broken for the dogs and an average of twenty miles a day will be good traveling. In the event of the Indian losing his bearings recourse will have to be had entirely to a compass. Tingley expects to be nearly two months on the road trip. He will remain at Ross river until after the election and then bring in the returns with him from those two sub-divisions.

THE MATSON CONCESSION

Effort to Quash the Proceedings Futile—May be Re-opened.

Information was received in Dawson this morning that may have considerable effect upon the ultimate solution of the much vexed concession question. The famous case of Hartley et al vs. the Matson concession has been on trial both before the gold commissioner and the territorial appellate court. Before the first named tribunal judgment was given by which it was held that the court was without jurisdiction. This view was also taken by the appeal court. The matter is now before the federal supreme court and defendants have sought to quash the case on the ground that the right of appeal did not exist at the time the same was made. Information received by the attorneys in the case today is to the effect that an adverse decision has been given on the point raised by the defendant concession and the appeal will be heard. Should the appellants be given a favorable decision it is likely that the case will be reopened in Dawson before the court of original jurisdiction, viz., the gold commissioner's court. The claim is set up by the plaintiffs in this case that the concessionaire in securing his grant did not comply with the legal requirements, therefore the concession should be invalidated. The firm of Tupper & Peters have charge of the case at Ottawa, and it is understood that an early decision may be anticipated.

It is reported that successful experiments have been made at Denver, Col. with a new process for making lead direct from the ore, without the intermediary work of refining. By this process the crude ore is not concentrated but is powdered finely, mixed with salt and roasted. The chlorine gas generated carries off the metals in fumes, which are treated to precipitate the metals in a pure state. At present from 10 to 20 per cent. of the value of ore is lost in concentration.
