DR. BODENSHEIN and MR. WALTON welcomed the Attorney-General's proposal which they thought would be most helpful.

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL said that he proposed to incorporate in his note a statement explaining the position of New Zealand as indicated by Mr. Berendsen.

MR. BERENDSEN saw no necessity for any further meeting. He thought that the Committee had taken the question as far as it was possible for advisers to do, and he welcomed the Attorney-General's proposals to circulate copies to the various Delegations of his note prepared for the United Kingdom Delegation.

In reply to Mr. Broeksma, the ATTORNEY-GENERAL thought that pending some decision by the Principal Delegates to set up a Committee with formal terms of reference the Committee must remain in its present informal state. He hoped to be able to circulate informally for observations the draft note of the discussions which he would prepare for the United Kingdom Delegates.

Registration.

MR. KNOWLES informed the Meeting that as a result of enquiries it had been ascertained that in 1924 the Commonwealth of Australia had registered at Geneva an agreement with another Member of the Commonwealth dealing with postal matters. This registration was due to inadvertence and subsequently attempts had been made to cancel the registration though without success.
