

Address by Prosecutor on Tuesday

President and Gentlemen:

The prosecution would like to say that seeing the defence dealt with the case in a fair manner but it does not feel that he has as completely made out its case. Take some of the points in order as the question of identification again the prosecution points to the evidence of the first two witnesses in their statements as to the identity of the accused. The two witnesses are held in that determine by the evidence of Lieut Lawrence who stated that as far as possible the same guards are always placed at the same spot to enable them to recognize those passing through the gate more readily. The prosecution submits that when a guard has had at least two months' practice in guard duty he becomes very proficient in recognizing individuals although the guard the guard may not know the names of these individuals.
